# MOVIES

## CHARLIE MURRAY IS AT HIS FUNNIEST

That veteran, eternally funny comedian of the stage, vaudeville and screen fame, Charlie Murray, rises to new heights in First National's "The Head Man" at the Star Theatre, on Friday and Saturday.

Not that Murray, Lucine Littlefield and other notable comedians in "The Head Man" do not indulge in some riotous behavior, that brings gales of laughter. The burlesque incidents, however, are part of a human, logical story, and they are set forth in effective contrast to some real drama and pathos.

Larry Kent, the attractive young leading man, and Loretta Young, fresh and beautiful little leading lady, supply the romantic element charmingly. Some old ladies of the story, capably enacted by character women, bring roars of mirth. Notable among them

are elderly twins, as alike as two ball bearings.

The plot is that of the novel, photodramatized and spiced with many hilarious "gags". Briefly, it deals with the fall of Murray from a high political situation to that of a village drunkard and genial ne'er-do-well, albeit the father of a beautiful girl.

Through an ingenious combination of circumstances, he finds himself suddenly elevated again to the position he lost, that of "the head man" of Arcady.

The ingenuity of the plot lies in the manner of Murray's unexpected return to power, after years of striving for a "come-back" in his humble, ridiculed state. The villains of the piece, crooked politicians, do it for him without realizing that they are making a hero and "folling" themselves.

**HENRY ARTHUR JONES PLAY "THE PHYSICIAN" FILMED**

"The Physician" is a play written by Henry Arthur Jones, and originally produced by Charles Wyndham at the Criterion Theatre, London, in March, 1897, with himself as Dr. Carey, T. B.

Thalberg as "Walter Amphiel," Miss Marion Terry as "Lady Valerie," and Miss Mary Moore as "Edana Hinde." The film follows the play fairly closely, with some necessary elaboration, especially in the development of the character of "Jessie Curdon," which was merely a reference in the stage production.

"The Physician" is based on the theory that a dipsomaniac can never permanently regain mental control. In this treatment we are shown a man, who, because he knows the evils of alcohol, turns temperance reformer, and is sincere in his efforts to warn the rising generation of the dangers of drink. Unfortunately, he himself has lapses and comes under the influence of a girl whom he has betrayed. His fiancée, a clergyman's daughter, ascribes his occasional strange manner to some secret illness and insists on calling a specialist who, immediately diagnosing the disease and being himself in love with the girl is forced to take a decision to maintain the dipsomaniac in his deception of Edana and submerge his own affection for her. A crisis develops when "Jessie's" father recognizes the reformer as the man who led his daughter astray, and under the mental strain, Amphiel collapses and plunges into low London life with "Jessie". Edana sees his degradation with her own eyes, and his sudden death in a night club averts what might have been a tragedy for her and leaves the way open for the beginning of a romance with the doctor.

"The Physician" is an extraordinarily powerful drama, which George Jacoby has succeeded in developing "to the highest degree of intensity." The film is a succession of big emotional scenes brilliantly acted by the whole cast.

Miles Mander, as the dipsomaniac, has never given a better performance, and he is amazingly well supported by Elga Brink as "Edana," Lissi Arna as "Jessie", Ian Hunter as "Dr. Carey", Humberston Wright, Henry Vibart, Mary Brough, Julie Suedo, and a clever British child actor, Johnny Ashby. No finer cast has been seen in any British picture, and there is no doubt that George Jacoby the Director, has surpassed himself with "The Physician."
