**WARMER GIRLS FOR THE COLDER CITIES**

Girls at higher temperatures marry sooner, if figures dug out with commendable industry by the University of Wisconsin may be taken as indicative. In southern cities where girls no doubt are kept a little warmer, there are more married women, whereas in cities of the bleak and frigid north have more misses. At mean temperatures of 59 to 69 degrees Fahrenheit, girls remain only 27 per cent unmarried, while at temperatures of 45 to 48 degrees they remain 33 per cent unmarried. Though the temperatures mentioned in the Wisconsin report apply of course, to the cities' climate, they would appear to be in direct ratio to the emotional climate of the respective girls. That the men are not so hot in the northern cities may be another cause of the unmarried status of the north. The customs of the regions also affect the issue. The northern girl with more of a tradition of independence goes out to work, when she doesn't care to marry, and lets the men go chase themselves. But behind it all is higher temperature. The warm girl—if not too warm—from the land of the orange blossoms will more likely marry than the steam-heated girl of the frigid north.

**Durham to Have County Pavement**

County Council Met in Special Last Week. When Difference between This Town and County Commission Were Settled—Loses Road Rebates For Ten

So far as is known at present on the County Link running east the Hahn House here may come any time now, the differences between the County Roads Commission and the town having been settled the special meeting of the Council at Owen Sound last.

By the terms of the agreement it is to be seen that the county is to lose its road rebates for a period of ten years without at the county to construct the cost of roadway this summer.

The only hitch in the program comes from the C. P. R., the company having already objected to the reconstruction of the street overhead bridge. As a result the present program to build the concrete roadway east far as the bridge at present county to assume the maintenance of the roadway further east to the limits.
