Noted Hamilton Divine Delighted Presbyterians Congregations Sun Morning and Evening With His Recent Discourses—Annual Supper and Entertainment Held Monday

Two full houses attended the morning and evening services in the Presbyterian church here last Sunday, the occasion being the anniversary service of this congregation. At the evening service the church was scarcely big enough to accommodate the crowd, largest in attendance at any service since the opening of the new building a couple of years ago.

The church decorations for the occasion were very beautiful, roses, dragons and lilies being well displayed. There was a large attendance, and sister congregations of the town surrounding community and from the nearby towns and as a mark of respect the evening service in the St. Paul church was withdrawn.

HYDRO RATES MAY AGAIN BE REDUCED
Surplus of Over Two Million May Mean Refund to Patrons 1928 Bills—New Schedule of Being Worked Out.
The Mail and Empire, Toronto, published the following news item Tuesday:
"Rate reductions and in some refunds of one or two months' interest, the Mail and Empire is advised, result the total surplus of \$2,016,451.58 which the Ontario Hydro authorities rolled up by the sale of energy in 1928 according to the complete report of the year's operations issued yesterday by the Provincial Hydro Commissioner.
"The Commission is now out a schedule of future rate reductions and refunds," stated C. A. Hydro Commissioner, last night. "The surplus will be applied as far as possible to a lessening of the consumer in accordance with the mission's policy."
