

The Dominion Parliament

On Tuesday, May 21st, the House of Commons listened to the debate dealing with the export of liquor from Canada to the United States.

During the election campaign which followed, the Rt. Hon. W. L. McKenzie King gave earnest and hearty support to the investigation and to the report of the Committee.

Mr. Euler replied at considerable length. He took the ground that there was a strong public opinion in Canada opposed to the export of liquor from Canada to the United States.

The recommendation made by the special committee of the House of Commons has not been carried out by the House of Commons.

The four or five members who spoke urging the carrying out of the recommendation based their arguments chiefly round two points.

Several members pointed out that large sums of money had been paid by breweries and distillery companies to campaign funds.

Mr. Euler stated, to make such a measure effective you would also have to forbid the release of liquor or beer from the distilleries and breweries.

He claimed that United States authorities were not trying to enforce their own law, that their boats under five tons do not need to report when they return to their own country.
