**Lost Infant So In Motor**  
Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Bercavod in 8-10 Fergus last Friday—Place to Durham Sunday.  
One of the saddest accidents locally in a good many years last Friday shortly after George Orval, the 20-month-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert of Glencoe, a short distance from the corporation limits, died in a motor accident on Highway No. 6.  
Shortly before noon Ben Couits and daughter tinck, accompanied by and her little son, left for the holiday with a party. The party was in the city, about two miles south of Fergus, when the car was thrown rear tire blew and caused the car to swerve into the ditch.  
Mrs. Couits was nursing her nephew at the time the car was thrown into the ditch and when the car control it is thought she was against one of the wheels. When the car went over the side of the ditch through the window, the car was on the ground. First that the car had fallen, but these have since been correct as the only mark on the forehead, visible that a piece of the car had penetrated the head when picked up.  
Mrs. Couits was the only person injured, receiving wounds, but she was able to get home after having her head and the Fergus hospital. The loss of her baby was a great grief to her. The car was damaged.

Not Driving Fast  
At the time of the accident the car was being driven at a speed of 30 miles an hour. Coming to the hill Mr. Couits at the speedometer which around 30 miles, and might have picked up momentum when it topped the gas shaft off there was a 35-mile limit. It was while the hill that the tire blew rear end began to swerve and the brakes were applied headed for the ditch. The counting for the accident have to be classed as accidents which happen and no explanation can be made. Mr. Couits was quite the tragic ending of what had been a pleasant day's outing. blame can be attached to way.

Following the accident the car was sent to Durham and was repaired. He was accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Crut and a sister of Mrs. Atkinson, W. McKechnie, her father, Alex. Aljoe. The body was buried at the home of the parents.
