Threshing is dangerous

If weed seeds are allowed to become mixed with grain or straw when threshing they will cause serious loss and much hard labor in later crops

Do not permit a threshing machine to carry weed seeds to your farm. See that it has been properly swept out before entering your premises. A separator is built to remove weed seeds from grain and straw. See that it does so. All sieves should be in shape to do effective work. There should be a screen in the lower deck to remove weed seeds before they are blown into the straw.

Weed seeds should not be left to be carried about by animals and the wind, nor should they be swept into the barnyard. Destroy them. Burning is effective.
