Public Notice

To all persons having registered claims, or claims of which no notice has been registered existing prior to June 1st, 1890, against lands in any Registry Division in Ontario.

Whereas "The Investigation of Titles Act, 1929" enacts inter alia,—

3(1)—From and after the coming into force of this subsection, no person in dealing with land shall be required to show that he is lawfully entitled to such land as owner thereof through a good and sufficient chain of title, save and except during the period of forty years immediately preceding the date of such dealing as aforesaid, and no claim which has been in existence longer than the said forty year period shall affect such land, unless such claim shall have been acknowledged or specifically referred to or contained in an instrument registered against such land within the said forty year period or unless a notice is registered against such land as provided in subsections 3, 4 and 5 hereof.

3(2)—Subsection 1 shall come into force on the 1st day of June, 1930.
3(3)—Upon the coming into force of this Act and within one year thereafter, any person having a claim against any land, which claim has been in existence for forty years or more prior to the coming into force of this Act, but in respect to which claim no notice of its existence has been given, acknowledged, or specifically referred to or contained in an instrument registered against such land, within forty years prior to the coming into force of this Act, or any person on his behalf may register in the proper registry office a notice in which shall be set forth the claimant's full name and address and a description of the land and a detailed statement of such claim, verified by the affidavit of the person registering such notice.

3(6)—The registration of a notice as provided in sub-sections 3, 4 and 5 shall not in any way validate a claim which has otherwise expired.

THEREFORE TAKE NOTICE that any person having a claim against any land as above set forth must register notice thereof in the proper registry office before June 1st, 1930. If this is not done, except under certain conditions, then any land which is subject to such claim so registered prior to June 1st, 1890, or any claim existing prior to June 1st, 1890, of which no notice has been registered, shall be absolutely freed and released therefrom.

MINISTER'S STATEMENT REGARDING FOREST FIRES

"In some parts of the province the conditions are worse than they have been for ten years but so far the local foresters and fire chiefs have had the situation well in hand," said the Hon. William Finlayson, Minister of Lands and Forests for Ontario in a statement on the forest fire hazard.

"The fire conditions have been extremely bad this year," said Mr. Finlayson, who went on to stress the precautions taken against the fire menace in building up a permanent force of fire fighters and extending the services of watch towers, wireless and telephone communication and hose and pumps.

He was issuing a detailed statement so that the public may be aware of the situation and discount alarming reports, but it must be confessed that the fire hazard in the west is still alarming and nothing but heavy rains can relieve the situation," said the minister. "Undoubtedly there are careless prospectors and careless campers on this year there has been an unusual percentage of fires from lightning. The department invites the co-operation of the travelling public and acknowledges the help received from companies and those interested in the localities. It may be necessary to close areas from time to time but this will only be done as a last resort when it is absolutely necessary in the public interest."

The situation in Kenora is very bad and causing the department great concern. Fifty fires were reported in ten days and so great has been the strain on the staff that fire fighters have been sent in from other districts as reinforcements.
Fires are scattered over a large area in the Patricia district and a good deal of it is practically inaccessible, according to the official statement, practically all of the work done in the area is done from the air and the minister declared that the combination of workers on the wireless and in the air was not surpassed throughout the world as a fire fighting force.

"The season is not over and it is impossible to say what may happen if the present adverse conditions continue, but, to date, although the losses in timber are considerable they are a very small item in comparison with what was lost in former years and if the staff are able to hold the fires we will come through fairly well, although the acreage burned is bound to be higher than last year," is the summary of the prospects for the rest of the summer given by Mr. Finlayson.
