#### Glenelg & Priceville

**(Our Own Correspondent)**  
 I intend to take you on a visit through Glenelg this week and for fear of being trespassing on the good correspondent of Edge Hill, we will pass through and rest a while at Glenelg. Here we find a once busy place forsaken. Where once in years gone by the N. G. and J. McKechnie did a big business in the saw mill, all is now forsaken. Going back to some 70 or 80 years ago, the vicinity of Glenelg had fine material for future prospects of converting the natural growth of the forest in the shape of lumber for the

pioneers of that far away time in building barn and dwelling houses in the old time manner which can be seen mostly as relics of the past. Is there anyone in the vicinity of Glenelg who saw the uncultivated forest 80 years ago. I doubt not. Some of the old timers were John McCormick, John Ellison, Vaughan, Kenneth McKenzie, Nell McKechnie, Isaiah Melosh, and many others who have passed away many years ago. Mr. H. Williams was telling us he drew lumber from Glenelg to Durham to McKechnie Mills for one dollar a load and thought as much of a dollar then as two now.

Now we will pass on and stop awhile at Traverston. Here we are afraid again of trespassing on the good correspondent of that vicinity, but we will take the liberty of going back as far as his memory fails to recall the forests of olden times. In last week's Chronicle we saw mention of the founder of Traverston, Mr. John Travers. This brings to our memory that we set in the Glenelg Council with a young man with Mr. Travers in the year 1874. Mr. Travers was always successful in heading this pole. He carried on good business in the Grist and Saw Mill as he was a good and obliging business man. The late Mr. Ross was a good business man but applied it in a different manner. We wish the now new proprietor, Mr. McNally, success in his undertaking.

Now we go back to Hayward's Falls where once there was a grist and saw mill and electric light to Markdale by Mr. Mennies, but is now a thing of the past. The powerful water privilege is run as chopper. We take a walk back again to Dornoch. This place originally was called Clifton's Corner after the late Bartholomew Clifton, who was the original owner of lot 1, later the property of Billy Omara, who kept hotel for about forty years but now of the past. Mr. Omara is still a citizen and a farmer. The old timers have mostly passed away. There were Smiths, Blacks, Skenes, Ledinghams, etc. Dornoch was noted as some of its young residents chose the profession of the ministry. There were two at least. Rev. James Skene was one, who was raised on the farm. Mr. Skene ran at Reeve of Glenelg when a young man against the late Charles Moffat, who defeated him by one vote. Mr. Skene often said it was the best thing that even happened him to be defeated, for it elected one, he might be elected a year after year. Mr. Skene is now one of the old Presbyterian ministers in Toronto. Rev. James Fraser Smith is another of Dornoch's young men who chose the ministry. Mr. Smith has a charge some where in Ontario. He served for many years as missionary in China.

Now we will take across to Pomona or, as it was once called Purdy's Mills. In olden times there was a grist and sawmill there but did not exist very long and only the place where it was erected are visible. The late H. H. Arrowsmith kept a grocery store. We are not sure whether Mrs. Arrowsmith is carrying on the business yet or not. If so she will be sure of patronage. Here is the fine Catholic Church where the faithful assemble every Sunday. A fine concrete shed provides good accommodation for the dumb animals. The fine cemetery is kept in good order with the cross of the Saviour erected in the centre as a reminder of the Saviour or the world. Many of the old pioneer's mounds are getting covered with the natural growth of the ground and only the marble slabs and tall monuments can recall the names of those sleeping beneath the sods. I will quit now and give some of the present events.

This Monday morning, the 26th of August has a fine appearance and the busy farmers will all be engaged in garnering the contents of the thousands of acres in stock. While some are busy trying to finish cutting many fields awaiting the call "Cut me down, for the time of my existence is up and I am ready to yield to my saviors' machinery in bundling up my contents into sheaves."

Mr. John L. McKinnon, B.A., of Saskatoon Collegiate, spent a while with his brother, Mr. Arch. McKinnon, South Glenelg. J. L. is going on his 19th year on the teaching staff of the Collegiate. At the old home he is not so proud to use the pitch fork while loading the grain of his brother. He is leaving for his home in Saskatoon the latter part of this week.
