This does not meet with the approval of the Council and at last night's meeting it was decided to advertise it for the legal 21 days and give the opposing ratepayers an opportunity of stating their case to the Railway Commission or whoever it is that deals with cases of this kind. In the meantime the work is to go ahead on the Lambton west and Bruce sections in the hope that the disputed portion will be settled before the work
