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SLEEPING LIKE LOG DECLARED BAD SIGN

Curl Up Like a Kitten is the Modern Scientists' Advice.

New findings on how to sleep best were reported at a symposium on sleep at the Ninth International Congress of Psychology. To curl up like a kitten seems to give the greatest possible relaxation. Sleeping "a log" may be a bad sign, a warning of overstrain. When sleep refuses to come it is probably the muscles that bar the Sandman's arrival. "Prevailing conceptions of sleep were heavily shaken by the experimental findings presented by ten investigators," said H. M. Johnston of Mellow Institute, Pittsburg, Chairman of the symposium, in summing up.

It was found that young children walt about three times as long as adults to go to sleep after going to bed. Leading authorities on care of young children prescribe more hours for sleep than the child will actually take, according to Dr. Josephine C. Foster, Institute of Child Welfare, Minneapolis. City children sleep longer than country children. Children of better educated mothers take more naps during the day than other children. The average time for going to sleep is about 20 minutes.

RUINED, AND HOW!

This writer in a Peterboro paper is pessimistic. "Doesn't it look much stock in the tale of woe of hard times when he writes in this vein:

"An earful of talk I overheard yesterday from two citizens had set me thinking.

"These two sad-faced individuals were lamenting the high tax rate that according to them was grinding the faces of the poor and turning this once prosperous city into a poverty-stricken community.

"Isn't it the truth?

"On every side of us there are signs of pinching and poverty.

"Take motor cars; did you ever stop to think that there are working men's families in this town forced to drive around in last year's models of touring cars? Imagine that! An industrious bread winner working 5 1/2 days a week and in spite of his toil he has to suffer the humiliation of knowing his family has no other means of transportation save an open car! You who drive in your sedan or coach, imagine how you'd feel if you had nothing but a touring model. Dire poverty, nothing else.

"And radios, too. Here in this tax-ridden city there are families actually using battery sets. Think of it; while others enjoy the advantage of an electric radio, these poor destitute families have to struggle along with an 8 or 9 tube battery outfit. I'm told, too, that in some cases they have not even single dial control.

three visits a week to the picture show; making last year's electric washing machine do another year; scarcely able to keep enough away from the tax collector to get a vacuum cleaner.

Back in the days of low taxes when Peterborough was prosperous our girls wore warm cotton stockings. Alas, you'd look for them in vain today. Gone are the cotton leg coverings of the golden era and now the females of our impoverished generation have to brave the elements with flimsy silk stockings. Think of it!

"Gas companies building cathedral-like service stations; big chain stores scrapping for locations on the main street; picture shows only able to scrape up \$20,000 for the talkie equipment; family after family who are lucky to know where their next car is coming from; the golf club forced to enlarge their course to 18 holes to give employment to some tax crushed landscape expert; the bowlers struggling along with a mere pittance of \$10,000 to construct new greens; only a few miles of street likely to be paved; hungry children buying over two thousand ice cream cones in one afternoon at one store—everywhere dire indications of destitution.

AFTER HARVEST CULTIVATION

(Experimental Farms Note)

Ploughing hay and pasture sod in the late summer or early fall followed by frequent working of the land with the disk harrow until late in the fall, will germinate the seeds of annual weeds and destroy the weed seedlings. If perennial weeds like couch grass are present the ploughing of the sod should be about 5 inches in depth and this operation should be followed immediately by a light disking to prevent the soil baking. Two or three diskings at one week intervals should be made hereafter to break up the sod. After the sod is rotted the cultivator, preferably one with stiff teeth, should be used at week or ten-day intervals until late fall.

If the land to be cleared is grain stubble, it may not be necessary to plough the land after the grain is harvested, but the disk or cultivator may be started at once, and the soil worked frequently during the balance of the growing season.

A late fall ploughing should be given to the land to which these after harvest cultivations are applied, and the land should be left rough over winter. If possible, a cultivated crop should be planted in the following spring, and this should be kept thoroughly worked in order to destroy the weeds which are left.

The weather which prevails during the late summer and fall will be a determining factor in the success which after harvest cultivation has on weed destruction. If the season is not too wet good results should attend these soil cultural operations.
