Post Office, Depots Burglarized Tuesday

Thieves Received But Little Reward For Their Work, However.—Evidence Points That Jobs Were the Work of Amateurs.

Sometime during the early hours of Tuesday morning Durham was visited by burglars, who forced entrance into the Post Office, and both C.N.R. and C. P. R. stations. The reward for the night's adventure was small and would hardly pay for the trouble necessary to pull off the job. At the post office between five and ten dollars was collected, the personal money of Postmaster Smith, while about five dollars in change was the sum total obtained at the C. N. R. At the C. P. R. there were no results, nothing in the nature of money being missed. In all three instances the thieves gained entrance by the use of a jimmy, breaking open the doors or windows of the places visited. Less than fifteen dollars in negotiable currency was the total reward for the night.

County Roads In Good Shape Says Warden

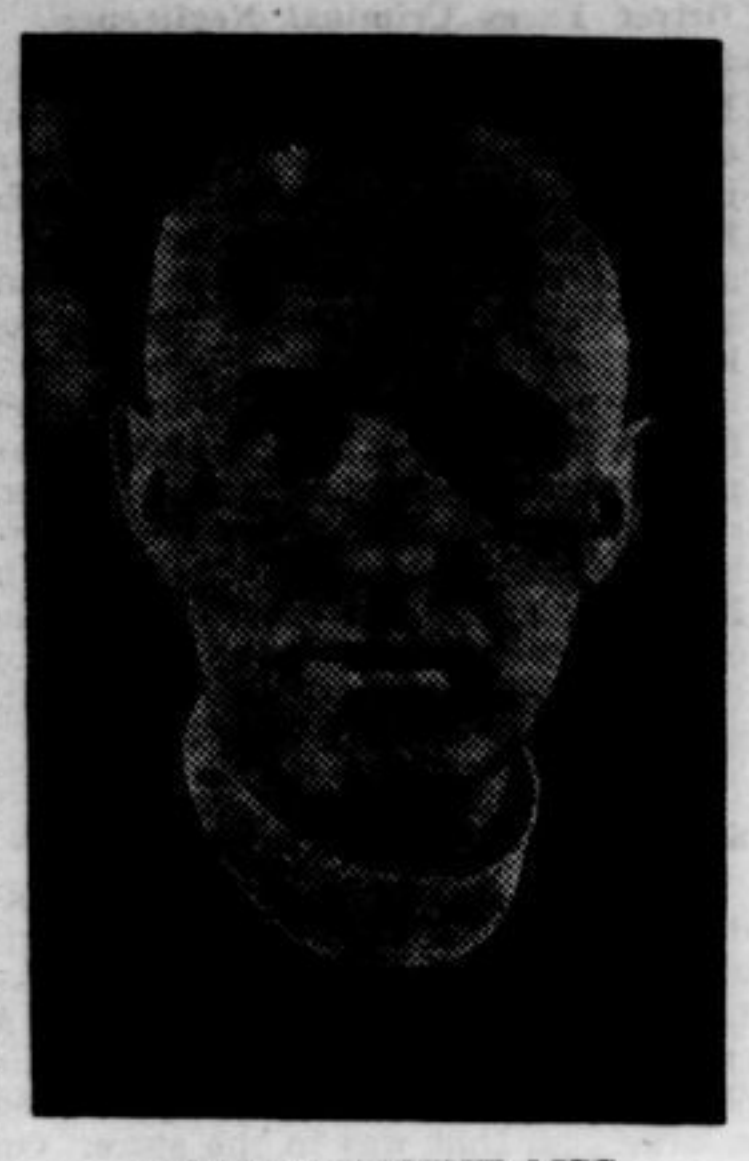
County Roads Commission Made the Annual Fall Trip Over County Last Week.—May Pave at Dundalk Next Year.
