SOCIAL ARBITER RULES ON "SET" AS FILM IS MADE

Etiquette in "Her Private Life" is Okayed by English Expert.

English etiquette is different from that of Hollywood. So when a story of English country life is filmed, like "Her Private Life", the Billie Dove story coming to the Star Theatre, November 15 and 16, a social arbiter stays on the set and tells the players what to do, and how to do it. Wilfred Noy, an English actor of experience, was delegated for the task when "Her Private Life" was made by First National.

This expert on social customs tells the footmen when to wear knee breeches; the barkeep what drinks to serve, and when; the butler when to say "Me Lady", and all the little niceties of English society.

"Her Private Life" provides Miss Dove with one of the most dramatic roles she has played. She portrays an English noblewoman who is divorced by her drunken husband and who finds poverty and distress (but eventually love) awaiting her in New York.

Alexander Korda directed the picture, and Walter Pidgeon plays opposite the star.

The practically all-star cast includes Montagu Love, Holmes Herbert, Roland Young, Thelma Todd, Zasu Pitts and many others.

The picture has beautiful settings and the true English atmosphere in the sequences that take place in "the right little, tight little island."

"FOR HEAVEN'S SAKE!" LATEST LLOYD COMEDY

Harold Lloyd may some day answer the requests of thousands of admirers throughout the country, to produce a college sequel to "The Freshman", but his latest comedy, "For Heaven's Sake!" takes him out of the light atmosphere that distinguished his football classic into the more sombre air of a big city's underworld. The picture is at the Star Theatre November 18 and 19.
