cent larger than last year. The European production is about normal in contrast to 1928, when the crop was very short.

The hold over in the United States, Canada and Europe was very small, consequently new beans are meeting a ready sale. Quotations on imported European beans which compete with Ontario grown of good quality have gone up during recent weeks, the November 1st price being \$3.75 a bushel f.o.b. Montreal.

Longer Light Days
For several years past poultry breeders have been trying to discover whether the use of electric light in laying houses really does increase the egg production among hens. The theory is that in prolonging daylight the hens were enticed to lay more eggs. Experiments over a period of five years at the Dominion Experimental Station with two pens, one supplied with the extra lighting facilities and the other without, show the following results: Over the five-year period, the pen of 100 hens supplied with light produced on an average 3966 eggs at a cost of 20c. per dozen in the six months. The pen without the light produced 3671 at a cost of 22c. per dozen. This gives an advantage of about 300 eggs for the pen with lights and at a reduction in cost of 2c. per dozen.

Poultry Breeding Stations
One important way in which the Poultry Department at O.A.C. is carrying its knowledge in a practical manner to the farmers of Ontario is by the establishment of poultry breeding stations for purposes of culling and general flock improvement. Last year there were approximately 50,000 hens on 160 farms which came under this plan, while this fall over 100,000 birds, representing 300 farms have been enrolled. The department has seven inspectors constantly on the road with a view to visiting each flock four times a year and culling undesirable specimens. Thousands of blood samples are taken and forwarded to the laboratories for testing, from which reports are sent back to the inspectors, who act upon them. A notable improvement in poultry standards has been achieved in this way.

New Interest in Field Peas
Thirty or forty years ago Ontario farmers grew annually about half a million acres of field peas, but when the weevil became troublesome, interest in the crop waned until there was less than 100,000 acres grown. However, during the past few years peas have been comparatively free from insect pests and the acreage has been increasing a little every year. Renewed interest has been obtained also by the development at the Ontario Agricultural College of an outstanding variety known as O. A. C. 181, which is now being distributed through the Experimental Station. This variety is a cross between Prussian Blue and White Wonder and is a fairly early ripening pea. Under a ten-year-test at the O.

POTATO STORAGE REQUIREMENTS

(Experimental Farms Note.)
Owing to the fact that a large percentage of the potato crop in the important potato growing areas of Canada is usually kept in storage for several months, the amount of profit from these potatoes depends largely on the degree of shrinkage which takes place under such conditions. Experiments, conducted by the Division of Botany of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, show that shrinkage in potatoes, occurring while in storage, can be greatly reduced, if correct storage practices are adhered to.

The following requirements are essential for the best storage of a percentage of the potato crop. All tubers placed in storage should be mature, healthy, as free from moisture on the surface, dirt, and mechanical injury as possible. Even the storage of a small percentage of diseased or field frosted potatoes endangers all of the healthy stock, regardless of how well storage conditions are maintained. It is practically impossible to keep large quantities of potatoes in good condition for prolonged periods unless the proper type of storage house is used.

Pamphlet No. 10 published by the Dominion Department of Agriculture fully explains the requirements for a proper type of storage house. The time of storage may be divided into the early, middle, and late periods. The early and late are the most critical periods. The early storage period usually includes the first six weeks, during which time the potato is active and gives off large quantities of heat and moisture. Successful storage during this period consists in properly ventilating the building in order to carry off the heat and moisture generated, and in getting the stock into a dormant state. Proper ventilation during this period will also prevent the development of rots which usually set in at this time. During the middle storage periods which includes, in general, the winter months, the potato is dormant and requires little attention, except taking precautions to prevent frost. The temperature should be approximately 38 degrees Fahrenheit. The late storage period involves the passing of the tubers from a resting state into the active state of growth. In order to prevent growth or sprouting, the temperature must be kept as low as possible without danger of freezing.
