Glenelg Council

Inaugural meeting held on January 13th. Members elect all present, having subscribed to all the declarations required by statute took their seats as follows: Messrs. Thos. J. Brodie, Reeve; J. J. Black, John McGirr, John McKechnie and S. H. Wright, Councilors.

Minutes were read and passed. The Road Supt. presented Voucher No. 1 for Road improvements amounting to \$275.04.

McGirr—McKechnie: That Voucher No. 1 be passed and payments made accordingly.—Carried.

By-laws were passed appointing the members of Board of Health for 1930, Auditors, Caretaker and Assessor and to authorize the Reeve and Treasurer to borrow money for current year as necessary. The following accounts were passed: W. N. Whitmore, school attendance officer for 1929, \$10.00; Jas. Ledingham, do \$5.00; John McKechnie, do \$5.00; H. H. MacDonald, telephoning \$1.25; J. McKechnie, 1 day overseeing \$3.00; S. H. Wright, 1/2 day overseeing \$1.50; J. McGirr, 1/2 day committee work \$1.50; Markdale Standard notice re election \$1.50; Bank of Commerce, collecting 143 tax bills \$13.95; Royal Bank, collecting 129 tax bills \$12.70; Bank of Toronto, collecting 132 tax bills \$12.90; Grey and Bruce Fire Insurance Co., 2nd premium on Insurance on Township buildings, \$7.20.

By-laws passed provided for the appointment of the following officers for 1930: Auditors, Wm. A. Robinson and Patrick J. McMillan, salary \$20. each; Members of local Board of Health: Dr. Bell, M.O.H., Thos. J. Brodie, Henry Beaton and H. H. MacDonald; Assessor for 1930, Eldon A. Weppeler at a salary of \$100.; Caretaker of hall and buildings, Wm. Marks at salary of \$25.; School attendance officers for South half of Township, W. N. Whitmore; for North half, John McKechnie (Glenelg).

Wright—Black: That John McGirr be appointed with the auditors to examine treasurer's securities and report at next meeting.—Carried.

McGirr—McKechnie: That we subscribe for 8 copies of Municipal Work for use of Council and officials.—Carried.

Wright—Black: That the Treasurer accept from the Treasurer of Holland Township the sum of \$751.0 re Township work Glenelg and Holland.—Carried.

McGirr—McKechnie: That we instruct the Treasurer to notify all persons in arrears of Taxes and appoint no collector until March 8.—Carried.

Black—Wright: That the Reeve and Clerk be authorized to sign the petition for Statutory grant on the amount spent on Township roads for 1929 and submit same to the Provincial Minister of Highways, as provided by Ontario Highways Act, said expenditures amounting to \$14,711.94.—Carried. Council adjourned to February 8th at 10 a.m. to receive Auditors' Report and for general business.

In Other Communities

Two Immigrants To The Front

The history of Canadian immigration is not without its stories of bitter experiences and tragic failures; but happily on every page there is the account of substantial successes just as in almost every neighborhood in Canada erstwhile immigrant families have become so much a part of the community that we pay no attention to their origin. Occasionally, too, someone appears much in the public eye, and then we learn that he also was once an immigrant to Canadian shores.

We are all immigrants in a sense. Our fathers or grandfathers or great-grandfathers braved the crossing and pioneered in this new land; but we who got here first look upon the newcomers as immigrants and will probably continue to call them such so long as we have millions of acres of unpeopled land.

And to what are the failures and the successes due? Geographical location of the immigrant seems to be only a minor factor. Assets in the beginning have proved helpful, but not of sufficient importance to guarantee success. All shades of politics, creeds, cults and traditions are represented alike in the failures and in the successes, so they may all be abandoned in the search for the secret of success. The easiest and perhaps the only correct answer is—it's 'th' man.

As the old year was fading into the past, two Canadians were mentioned in dispatches 'th' world over. One was Joseph H. B. Smith of Wolf Creek, Alberta, who won the sweepstakes prize on wheat at the Chicago Hay and Grain Show, thus becoming the "Wheat King" of the world. The other recipient of high honors was Honorable Charles A. Dunning, who was sworn in as Finance Minister of Canada to succeed the late J. A. Robb.

As an immigrant Joseph Smith picked himself a location far beyond even the fringe of settlement in Northern Alberta. He set up his cabin on a quarter section of land, but today he farms a square mile of land of which his original quarter is part, and not far from the thriving town of Edson.

As a seventeen-year-old immigrant, Charlie Dunning started as a farm hand in Saskatchewan. Eight years later he was a director of the Saskatchewan Grain Growers' Association. In 1911 he organized the Saskatchewan Co-operative Elevator Company, Limited, and was appointed General Manager. In this post he continued until 1916, when he entered the Saskatchewan Government as Provincial Treasurer. During the following six years he held different portfolios, and in 1922 became Prime Minister of the Province. It was only in 1926 that Honorable C. A. Dunning entered the Federal Government, but he now presides over the principal portfolio in the Cabinet, a position considered by some next to that of the Prime Minister himself.

The Finance Minister is still a young man, but what he has not already been taught in the school of hard knocks he may learn from his colleague, Hon. Robt. Forke, an immigrant from the land of the kilts and the oatmeal. It is interesting to note that Honorable Mr. Dunning and Joseph H. B. Smith both came from Leicester, England, and these fellow townsmen have shown the world what may be achieved in Canada in both public and private life.—Farmer's Advocate.

MARKED DECREASE IN CANADA'S TRADE

Nine Months' Period Compared to 1929 Shows \$147,066,256—Unmanufactured Copper Alone Shows Increase in Exports.

Trade and revenue returns for December are far from encouraging, there being a decrease in both exports and imports and the favorable trade balance while customs duties, excise taxes, excise duties and income taxes all show heavy decreases compared with the returns from these sources in December, 1929. There were substantial decreases in every important class of exports except unmanufactured copper.

Exports for December last were valued at \$88,520,355 compared with \$130,847,423 in the previous December; imports \$84,399,943 compared with \$94,620,925; the favorable trade balance of \$36,000,000 in December, 1929 decreasing to \$4,000,000 in December 1929. Trade in these months in wheat dropped \$30,000,000, flour \$1,400,000, fish \$600,000, furs \$1,500,000, meats \$300,000, cheese \$250,000, lumber \$340,000, wood pulp \$700,000, newsprint \$500,000, automobiles \$900,000, while unmanufactured copper increased \$250,000.

For the nine months of the present fiscal year total trade has decreased \$147,066,256 compared with the corresponding previous period. Exports in value decreased from \$1,072,640,200 to \$890,465,841, while imports increased to \$969,698,306 from \$936,349,170. A favorable trade balance of \$135,349,917 for the first nine months of the fiscal year 1929-29 has been replaced by an unfavorable balance of \$79,232,455 for the corresponding period in the present fiscal year.

It is now apparent that national revenue from the main sources will show a decrease during the present fiscal year, although for the first nine months there is a small increase, yet the revenue is falling so rapidly this will disappear before March 31. For December compared with December 1928, there was a decrease in customs duties of \$2,202,628, excise taxes \$1,757,971, excise duties \$162,144 and income tax of \$366,797. The net decrease from these sources for the month was over \$4,500,000 while the net increase for the nine months is only \$4,000,000 and there is yet three months of follow revenue in the present fiscal year.

Car Load of Live Muskrats Take Long Trip

There were a thousand of them, all alive and hungry, shipped by Canadian Pacific Express Company from Oak Lake, Manitoba to Hamburg Germany, via Canadian Pacific freighter Beaverford. Fluffy and friendly they went through the long trip away from their native marshes in good shape and were never so tired that they couldn't put away their carrot rations. It took fifty men several weeks to capture the requisite number without damage and by the use of special traps.

Two attendants in charge of the rodents were kept moving twelve hours a day each feeding and watering them. They travelled overland in specially constructed galvanized iron crates netted with wire and with an enclosed trough in each from which fresh water was available. On board the Beaverford, large cages were built as shown above in which the rats had more space to move around. This shipment which was made recently, constitutes a record for movement of muskrats or any other fur-bearing animal out of Canada overseas.
