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BERMUDA FLORA

Juniper Bermudiana Only Native Growth On Islands. The only native growth on the islands of Bermuda is the Juniper Bermudiana often mistaken and usually pointed out to visitors as cedar trees.

Each season of the year presents a gorgeous jangle of floral beauty. The brilliant flaming scarlet of the poinsettia intrigues the northerner at Christmas time, with the tiny greenish red and yellow flowers, surrounded by a whirl of large leaf-like flaming scarlet bracts.

Glorious hibiscus rivals the poinsettia for favor. Less passionate, 'tis true, but equally deserving of homage. Dense hedges line footpaths, the throaty, luscious, individual blooms measure from four to six inches in diameter.

Seductively oleanders, faintly perfumed, make a very rapid growth, often attaining a height of twenty feet, hedging off farm lands. Happy, harmonious colorings of rose, white and reds, flaunt their waxy beauty in spring time.

Acalypha, commonly known as the "match-me-if-you-can," fascinates the transient, by its provocative teasing peculiarities. Dense hedges, yet no two leaves all alike. Green to be sure they are, but each leaf is a different shape and each bears on its outer edge a tracing of deep rose, which in the distance tend to metamorphose in autumnal coloring the landscape.

Driving through the various parishes one is prone to stop and revel in some flower decked vista. Rivalling the blue of the sea, the humble northern convolvulus catches the eye. Ever scampering, clinging up and over trees, spilling over stone walls, peering out of crannies crevices with a sophisticated nonchalance utterly disconcerting.

Maeterlinks blue birds are legion on the islands. The saucy scarlet cardinals of lilting song flash from their hiding places and pour forth symphonies of love at mating time.

The Ontario Legislature

Toronto, February 13, 1930.

Accompanied by the ancient British parliamentary customs the first session of Ontario's 18th Legislature was opened at the Parliament Buildings, Toronto, on February 5, by Hon. W. D. Ross, Lieutenant-Governor.

In taking his seat as Leader of the Government, Premier Ferguson enters upon his 26th consecutive year as a member of the Ontario Legislature and holds the honor of "dean of the house."

Expressing rejoicing that His Majesty King George has sufficiently recovered his physical strength to resume public activities, the Speech from the Throne delivered by Hon. W. D. Ross indicated many measures proposed by the Government to better conditions throughout the province.

Rapid progress was made last year in the extension of electrical services in the rural districts, said Hon. Mr. Ross, while still greater advancement can be achieved by a modification of the cost of service.

The Research Foundation established some time ago is giving especial attention to agriculture which will prove to be one of its most valuable features.

Increased general efficiency of both elementary and secondary schools is noted by the Department of Education, while school attendance has reached the highest point yet recorded in the province.

Some 230 miles of permanent paving have been added to the Provincial Highway system, while increased governmental assistance is to be given for transportation facilities in the rural sections.

Annual production of the mines reached about \$110,000,000 last year, while the extent and quality of the lignite deposits at Blacksmith Rapids are being thoroughly investigated.

Recent discoveries of valuable mineral deposits in Northern Ontario warrant further extension of the provincial railway towards James Bay.

As a further step in the Government's interest in social welfare, a Royal Commission is at present investigating hospital, charitable institutions, social welfare, children's aid, and kindred matters to make suggestions for improvement and better co-operation of these important services.

A substantial surplus was reached by the government through a healthy condition of financing, and the provincial credit has been noticeably enhanced.

The Government will be able to meet the cost of Old Age Pensions and other fresh engagements without seeking new sources of revenue.

W. W. Staples, South Victoria, and A. W. Smith, South Essex, were the mover and seconder, respectively, of the address in reply to the Speech, both being new members to the assembly.

Mr. Staples while eulogizing the great natural resources of the province, recognized the men, women and children as the greatest assets of all.

Mr. Smith paid tribute to the Department of Public Health under the administration of Hon. Dr. Forbes Godfrey, which had carried to the remotest parts of the province health instruction by means of the efforts of public health nurses.

Premier Ferguson introduced his promised increase of bounty from one-half to one cent per unit on iron ore, which the Prime Minister explained will stimulate development of a dormant industry, stressing the importance of the steel industry to a nation's advancement, also increased employment and power use.

Others who spoke for the Government on the second reading of the bill were Hon. James Lyons, Sault Ste. Marie, A. V. Waters, North Cochrane, and Dr. J. M. Robb, Algoma.

On the brokerage house situation, W. E. N. Sinclair, Liberal Leader, opened an attack upon Hon. W. H. Price, Attorney General, in dealing with a section of the Speech from the Throne which said that certain objectionable practices that had been observed will be dealt with by further legislation.

Mr. Sinclair turned his debate into a personal attack upon the Attorney General, claiming that the Attorney General's brother and brother-in-law were engaged in the business.

Mr. Sinclair, declaring his methods "small" in mentioning rumors while the Attorney General was not present, Hon. Mr. Price denied frankly that his brother or brother-in-law were engaged in the business and that he intended to prosecute where prosecutions are required without fear or favor.

Hon. Mr. Price called a conference of representatives of all Attorneys General in Canada in an effort to co-ordinate the various provincial security frauds acts.
