FIRST AID SCHOOL ON WHEELS... FOR the benefit of employees isolated from the larger centres, the Canadian National Railways have put into operation three travelling first-aid instruction cars. Fully equipped and in charge of competent instructors, these cars will travel to outlying points, bringing courses of instruction to engine men and train men, agents and construction and maintenance of way men who have ordinarily no means of obtaining the knowledge. One car will work in the western region of the railway, one in the central region and one in the Maritime Provinces. While their primary use is for instruction, they are, as well, travelling dressing stations ready to assist in emergency. They are the first cars of this type ever to go into service on a railroad in Canada, if not on the continent. Their Excellencies, the Governor General and Lady Willingdon, Colonel C. A. Hodgetts, Director-General, and other members of the St. John Ambulance Association, who inspected the first of the three cars, were much impressed by their value.
