

This Is Basis of Suggested New Law Affecting Ontario Motorists.-Those Causing Accidents Would Pay Compulsory Insurance at Higher Than Standard Rates.

A complete file containing the record of every motorist in Ontario who becomes involved in a motor accident anywhere in the province will be made necessary if legislation is passed in accordance with the suggestions of the Hon. Mr. Justice Frank E. Hodgins, of the supreme court of Ontario which are advanced in his recent interim report on the compulsory insurance of motor-

Although the report considers that compulsory automobile insurance is inadvisable for motorists generally, it advocates the enactment of a so-called "financial or safety responsibility law" which, in brief, requires any motorist were garbed in red, white and blue by his accident. 
