Council met April 7. Members all present. Minutes adopted. Watson—H. McEachern: That the report of the Road Superintendent for winter work on roads be adopted.—Carried.

Philp—Watson: That the Clerk communicate with Mr. J. D. Ross in reference to sideroad, lots 15 and 16 concession 5.—Carried.

N. McEachern—H. McEachern: That this Council accept Mr. R. A. Nicholson's offer for the Rhoda J. Way property.—Carried.

N. McEachern—Watson: That the account of late Dr. Charles McLellan Estate for medical services amounting to \$25.00 be paid. Also the account of William Kennedy for use of car, amounting to \$4.00 be paid.—Carried.

Philp—H. McEachern: That the rate of payment for work performed on roads be as follows: Man and team 50c. per hour; man 25c. per hour; gravel 10c. per yard; load of gravel to be 1 1/2 yards where possible.—Carried.

Trustees of the Police Village of Holstein waited upon the Council in reference to the Holstein bridge where by a settlement was effected and an agreement arrived at.

N. McEachern—Watson: That the price of the beams for sidewalks, supplied by the Township be \$200.00 instead of \$344.00 as mentioned in former statement of cost of bridge to be borne by the Police Village.—Carried.

The Ontario Legislature

April 3, 1930. First session of Ontario's 19th legislature was prorogued on Thursday afternoon by Hon. W. D. Ross, Lieutenant-Governor, accompanied by the ancient customs of British Parliaments. The Lieutenant-Governor after reviewing the military guard, was escorted into the Legislative chamber by Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, Prime Minister, to be greeted by crowded galleries, as were witnessed at the opening ceremonies just two months ago.

In his speech from the Throne, the Lieutenant Governor drew attention to the outlook for Agriculture, which he said engages widespread attention. "The spring is opening somewhat later than usual," said His Honor, "but much work was done last fall and live stock have wintered favorably. The improvement in the methods of production and marketing continues to be the most valuable assistance than can be given to agriculture."

In regard to Hydro, His Honor observed that legislation passed at the session just concluded would open up enlarged spheres of usefulness for this great public undertaking. "The measures you have adopted will help to extend the advantage of electrical services in the rural districts," said Hon. Mr. Ross. "Plans have been approved which will serve to make power more generally available for the mining industry. These changes together with the increased normal demand for power have made it necessary to secure additional sources for the production of electrical energy."

Amendments made to the school law provide a progressive system of Primary school inspection, he continued, as well as increasing facilities for Secondary education. This legislation combined with the generous aid you have given to all branches of education will it is confidently hoped tend to stimulate the efforts of teachers and trustees in this most important public service.

Commenting on the financial responsibility law for automobile drivers, His Honor said: "This law will assist in the control and regulation of motor transportation. Increased financial help has been provided for rural roads, while the proposal that the provincial roads be officially designated "The King's Highway" has met with general approval and has been embodied in the law of the province."

In connection with the Security Frauds Prevention Act, and the prosecution of brokers found not within the law, His Honor observed that the principles approved at the Conference of Attorneys-General have been embodied in the laws of the province. As to the new five year sessional term his Honor said this important change, meeting with general public approval will make the law on this subject almost uniform throughout the Dominion.

Touching on the Liquor Control situation, His Honor said the report of the Liquor Control Commission gives valuable information as to the operation of the Act. The sale of native wine has been brought within the scope of the permit system and the law amended with the view to making it more effective in the interest of sobriety.
