used in his writing." Telegraphy was not easy in those days. Rodger began as a "ham" operator with the Montreal Telegraph Company, now part of the National System, in 1874. Ten years later, he was Night Chief operator and he successively became Wire Chief, Day Chief Operator, Circuit Manager for the Montreal division, Inspector of Telegraphs for the Grand Trunk, Superintendent of Telegraphs and Telephones for the Canadian National Railways. He was made Specia! Representative in 1924. Revalling the Associated Press wire, on which Drummond worked, before the coming of the typewriter, "he says; "We made ten copies of despatches by using oiled tissue with carbons between and writing with an agate or steel stylus. 'Breaking' on the wire was not allowed-in fact you could not break, if you would, as it was a oneway repeater. Using your combined mind and muscle for a stretch of three hours, without let up, was a most nerve wracking job. When special happenings were afoot, such as the Russo-Turkish war, the seances were strung
