GOOD MONEY IN HOGS IF FED RIGHT

"There's no money in hogs today," says one farmer.

"There's good money to be made in hogs," says another.

What is right? Both of them! Strange as it may seem, it is true. The reason lies in the way each farmer is feeding. The truth of farmer number one's statement is easily shown by the following facts:
