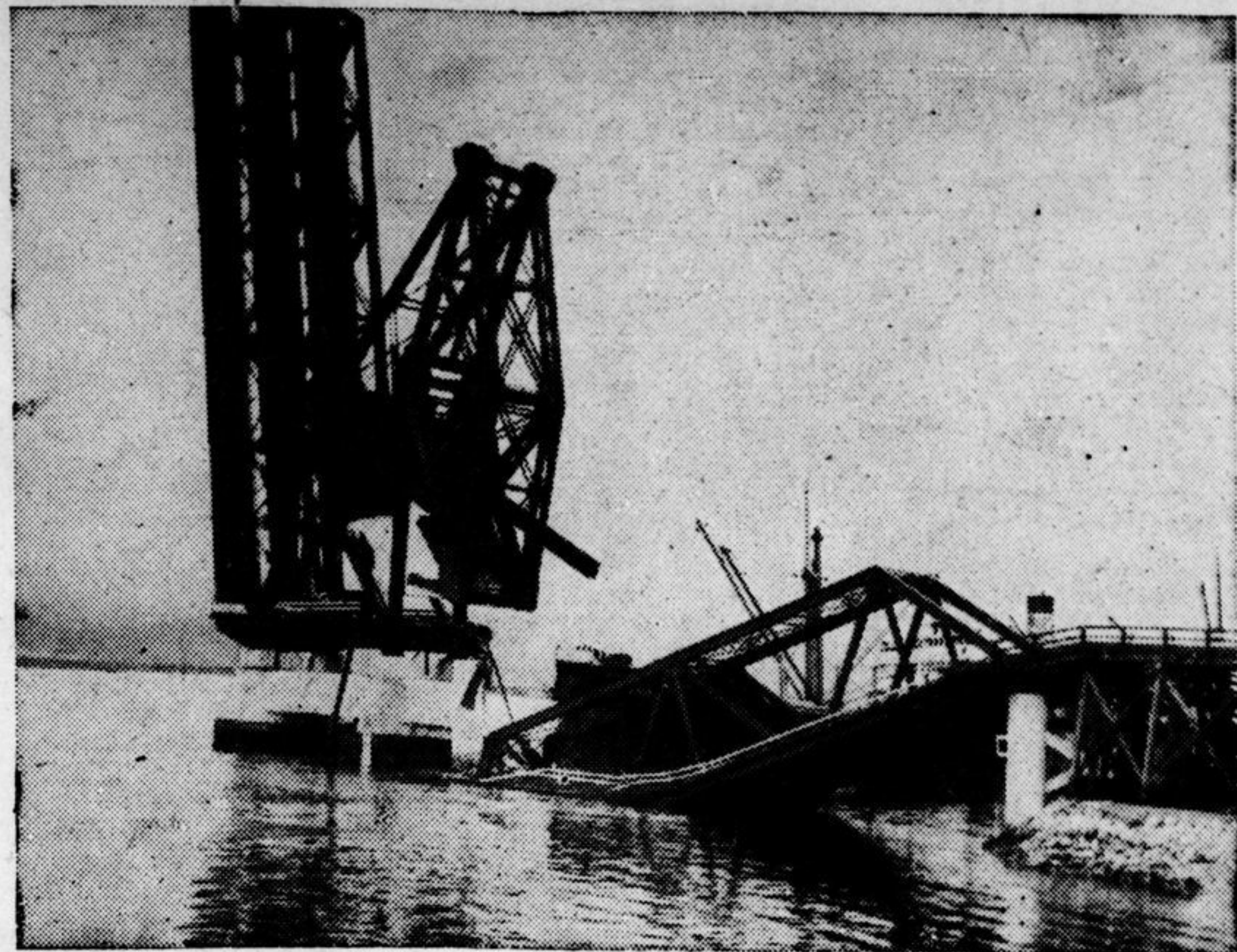

OTHER PAPERS' OPINIONS

Famous Native Sons

It is always pleasing to open a paper from some of the towns in Western Ontario and to read of some native son of the town who has gone away and has made a name for himself. Very often the story is accompanied by a picture of the great man. Every town can supply such instances and in many cases the Old Boy has forgotten a great deal about his birthplace and doesn't even bother to come back for an occasional visit.

It is even better to learn of rarer instances where young men have stayed in their home towns or have returned to them after receiving their education and have built up successful careers in the smaller places. Such men are the very backbone of the smaller towns and they are numerous, too, although they may not get their life history in the papers very often, because, having them always with us, we may be apt to overlook them.

Fergus has been fortunate in having many young men who made their careers in their own home town. The last two weeks have emphasized several cases. The incident of the two special freight trains which left Fergus on Saturday morning naturally recalls the great success of the Beatty brothers, assisted more recently by a large number of other young men who grew up in Fergus. They showed that it was possible to build up the greatest industry of its kind in the Empire in an ordinary small town and it does not seem likely that the company could have done better, or even as well, in a large city.

A week or so before that, Dr. A. Groves commenced the sixtieth year of active practice of medicine and surgery in Fergus and he, too, has risen to the very heights of his profession. The young people who are looking around for a place to start a career might think of these men and others and consider a long time before they leave Fergus or whatever other small town may be their home.—Fergus News-Record.

Daylight Saving

Daylight saving, after waging a losing battle for years, seems to be surprisingly popular this year and one city and town after another is falling under its spell. There are several reasons. It has always been popular with players in every line of sport that must be played in daylight. Amateur gardeners welcome it, although a minority find it as easy and pleasant to work for an extra hour before breakfast as for an extra hour after supper. The radio probably has something to do with it since practically all radio programmes are on fast time. Many motorists also favor the extra hour of daylight in the evenings. Thus, you have a majority of town dwellers in favor of the change or at least neutral. The chief opposition still comes from the farmers, although many of them are able to work their own hours and it is only occasionally that the change of time in the nearest town conflicts with them.—Fergus News-Record.

SMALL POTATOES COUNT

With the recognition of the small potato in official seed grades, and its increasing popularity in the export trade or seed purposes, the old familiar epithet "small potatoes" takes on a new meaning. "Certified Seed Potatoes Grade Small Size" is the new grade provided under the regulation of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, and the potato grower will now be able to sell a much larger portion of his crop at a premium as certified seed, insofar as the small size, 1 1/2 to 3 ounce tubers conform to the requirements for certified seed stock. The new regulation has another purpose as well, it assists in the effective control and eradication of potato disease. Further, only certified seed potatoes may now be sold as seed stock.
