**GOVERNMENT FARMS ARE BUSY**  
An appreciation of the range and extent of applied agricultural research carried out by the Experimental farms and stations of the Dominion Department of Agriculture throughout Canada is afforded by the report of the Director, Dr. E. S. Archibald. At the time the report was prepared there were 2,453 active experimental projects in operation, ranging in application from "Agrostology" to "Tobacco". Horticulture heads the list with a total of 641 active experimental projects; then in order come animal husbandry, 421; botany, 295; field husbandry, 282; poultry husbandry, 168; agrostology, 149; cereals, 124; chemistry, 105; illustration stations, 76; tobacco, 69; bees, 63 and pathology, 25.
