Following a concert in Milan, where the Italian people acclaimed him, Toscanini took his orchestra to London, to play in the famous Royal Albert Hall, where he scored a great triumph before 10,000 enthusiasts, including King George and Queen Mary. General Dawes, United States Ambassador to Great Britain, presented Toscanini with a piece of parchment of musical worth after the performance in London.
