The profession of the civil engineer was defined in 1928 at the time of the formation of the Institution of Civi Engineers in London as "the art of directing the great sources of power in nature for the use and convenience of man." The term was invented by John Smeaton (1724-92), one of the most celebrated of the gifted group of men, who during the eighteenth century took such an important part in the development of public works in England, to emphasize the difference between his work and that of the military engineer, which was of the same character.

The civil engineer is primarily interin structures. Foundations, bridges, tunnels, dams, reservoirs, aqueducts, are in his realm. He irrigates deserts and reclaims swamps. He lays out and constructs highways, railroads, canals, and makes harbors, wharves and lighthouses. His work is often definitely of a pioneering nature, involving great physical effort. A civil engineer must have a scientific mind, possessing also imagination, initiative, accuracy and good judgment. He also should have administrative ability and be able to work with men as well as


