Twenty-four years ago a similar job was offered and a volunteer for it was soon found. The temperature of his head was taken whilst he was wearing all kinds of hats, and here are some of the results: a yachting cap, 98 degrees; a policeman's helmet, 97 degrees; a bowler, 92 degrees; a top hat, 89 degrees; a straw hat, 82 degrees; a tweed cap, 94 degrees; a panama 78 degrees. INTERESTING STATISTICS ABOUT THE WORLD Do you know that the world's annual income is \$167,500,000? This astonishing fact is revealed by the report of a German bank, which has been studying world statistics for six years. Other interesting points from this report are: The world is drinking more milk and more tea, more coffee, but less cocoa. We eat less bread, and fruit and vegetables are taking its place. We are smoking less tobacco, in spite of the large increase in women smokers. In England there are thirty-five people to every motor-car. CIVIL ENGINEERS ARE USEFUL PERSONS The profession of the civil engineer was defined in 1928 at the time of the formation of the Institution of Civil Engineers in London as "the art of directing the great sources of power in nature for the use and convenience of man." The term was invented by John Smeaton (1724-92), one of the most celebrated of the gifted group of men, who during the eighteenth century took such an important part in the development of public works in England, to emphasize the difference between his work and that of the military engineer, which was of the same character. The civil engineer is primarily interested in structures. Foundations, bridges, tunnels, dams, reservoirs, aqueducts, are in his realm. He irrigates deserts and reclaims swamps. He lays out and constructs highways, railroads, canals, and makes harbors, wharves and lighthouses. His work is often definitely a pioneering nature, involving great physical effort. A civil engineer must have a scientific mind, possessing also imagination, initiative, accuracy and good judgment. He also should have administrative ability and be able to work with men as well as materials. "FUNNY" HAS WIDE MEANING IN SCOTLAND The word "funny" has a very wide meaning in Scotland. It does not merely signify amusing or entertaining; it is more frequently used to describe something interesting unusual, or even alarming. In childhood to feel funny on a Monday morning often meant a day off school; it was a vague form of illness that might be anything and was safer than complaining of anything local. "He's a funny character," does not imply that he is an amusing person; but that he is rather shady. But perhaps the funniest use of "funny" was that of the old lady who asked her little grandson when he returned from a visit to the neighboring parsonage: "Was it funny, Johnnie; was it funny?"
