Glenelg Council

Met on February 13th in the Township Hall. The members were all present, the Reeve in the chair. Minutes of January meeting were read and passed. A number of communications were read, among them being one from R. C. Muir, chief engineer of Municipal roads, acknowledging receipt of the Road Superintendent's report of work on roads in 1931 and promising early consideration of same. The auditors, Messrs. Patrick McMillan and W. A. Robinson presented their report which was adopted. The total receipts for the year 1931 were \$57,228.62, and total expenditures \$64,580.81, leaving a balance on hand of \$2,647.81.

McGirr—McKechnie: That the auditors' report be adopted and auditors be paid \$15 each for their services and that clerk be instructed to get 30 copies of report printed.—Carried.

The road superintendent presented voucher No. 2 for road improvements. McGirr—Boyd: That Voucher No. 2 be accepted and payments made accordingly. Total amount being \$177.15.—Carried.

The following payments were made on resolution: Treasurer, Town of Durham, Glenelg's share of Durham Division Court Fees for 1931, \$9.60; clerk, for registering 23 births, 1 marriage and 20 deaths, \$11.00; Grey and Bruce Fire Insurance Company, first instalment on Township buildings \$8.20; McFadden's Drug Store, account paper \$1.40; Treasurer, telephoning, 30 cents; J. N. Perdue re search Treasurer's securities, 75 cents; auditors and J. McGirr, do \$1.00 each; J. A. Boyd, 1/2 day committee work \$1.50; Municipal World for 8 copies of Municipal World \$8.00 and assessor's and office supplies \$35.70.

The Treasurer was authorized to sell certain lots bought by the Township at tax sale in November 1931, providing this procedure was found to be legal.

Bylaw No. 750 was passed appointing pound keepers, fence viewers and sheep valuers for 1932 as follows: Poundkeepers, James Ellison, Hugh Wright, John A. Beaton, Henry Eckhardt, Wes. Arnett; Fenceviewers, J. G. Firth, Walter Nichol, Duncan Smellie, Wm. McLeod, J. J. McFadden, John McCarthy, Wm. R. Jack, Bert Coffey; Sheep Valuers, Ward 1, Wm. R. Edge; Ward 2, Malcolm McInnis; Ward 3, James McCarthy; Ward 4, Colin MacArthur.

McGirr—McKechnie: That members of this Council be paid \$2.50 per day; superintendent 30 cents per hour, man and team 40 cents per hour, man 20 cents per hour, and that the clerk be instructed to prepare bylaw providing for this for next meeting.—Carried. The Council adjourned to April 2, 1932. H. H. MacDonald, Clerk.

Egremont Council

Council met February 15. Members all present. Minutes adopted.

Patterson—Aldcorn: That the report of the road superintendent for work on roads be adopted.—Carried.

McEachern—Aldcorn: That the Reeve and Clerk be authorized to sign and submit to the Minister of Highways the Petition of the Corporation of Township of Egremont requesting the Statutory grant on the amount expended on roads 1931.—Carried.

Aldcorn—McEachern: That the Road Superintendent be instructed to gravel the Drewery side road, cost not to exceed \$100.00.—Carried.

McEachern Aldcorn: That the road superintendent attend the annual convention of the Ontario Goods Roads association to be held in Toronto February 22 and 23.—Carried.

Aldcorn—Patterson: That the Reeve attend the convention of the Ontario Township Roads Association, to be held in Toronto February 22 and 23.—Carried.

Philp—Patterson: That the tender of M. A. Koebel for the sum of \$150 for part of lot No 14, Main St. East, Holstein, be accepted, subject to restrictions and conditions in reference to tax sales, possession to be given immediately.—Carried.

The Auditors presented their report to Council. Aldcorn—Patterson: That the auditors' Report be received and adopted and 100 copies printed for distribution.—Carried.

Bylaws were passed appointing John T. Brown and Irvin Geddes sheep valuers in Polling Sub-Division Nos. 1 and 2 respectively; also providing for a reduction in salaries of officials and members of Council. Clerk's salary was set at \$315; Treasurer's at \$165; assessor's at \$125; members of Council, attendance at meetings, \$2.70 per day; road superintendent's salary remains the same, 40c per hour, but he receives no pay for attending council meetings and making up his books for council meetings; also authorizing Reeve and Treasurer to borrow \$25,000 from Bank of Montreal, Holstein, to meet current expenditure of the Township.

Resolved that the following accounts be paid: Hardy Harrison, sheep claim, \$9; James Geddes Est., inspecting sheep \$1.00; N. McDougall, services

school attendance officer 1930-31 \$8; Municipal World, subscriptions to World for 1932 \$8; do account to date \$6.07; clerk, registering 39 births, 5 marriages, 26 deaths \$17.50; J. M. Nicholson and Frank C. Hopkins, services as auditors, \$15.00 each; pay sheet No 2, expenditure on roads \$228.65; Road Superintendent, services \$10.00; Reeve Hunter expenses and membership fee re Ontario Township's Roads Association \$9.00; do services re water grievance \$1.10; members of council, attendance at meeting to date \$13.50; R. Christie use of room \$2.00.

Council adjourned to meet Monday, March 14, at 10 o'clock a.m. for general business. DAVID ALLAN, Clerk.

Baetz—Halliday: That the following accounts be paid: Council meeting at date \$12.20; George Fuehrer, caretaker of hall for nomination meeting and police court, \$2.00; Municipal World, dog tags and balance of account of 1931 \$26.86.
