DAIRY PRODUCTION GROWS

The current issue of the Dairy News Letter, issued by the Dominion Dairy and Cold Storage Branch, provides an interesting indication of the trend in dairy production. It shows, for instance, that during the ten-year period under review five new products have made their appearance, namely, condensed buttermilk, evaporated skim-milk, cream powder, butter milk powder, and malted milk powder. There has been a decrease of 26.5 per cent. in the volume of cheese manufactured, 40.1 per cent. in the production of condensed milk and 38.1 per cent. in the production of condensed coffee. In contrast with this, and indicating the changing trend of production, there has been an increase of 1,016.9 per cent. in the production of casein, of 599 per cent. in the production of condensed skim-milk, of 223.1 per cent. in the manufacture of ice cream, of 149.9 per cent. in the manufacture of skim-milk powder, and of 108.2 per cent. in the amount of cream sold as butter-fat.

(Continued from page 6.) placement of machinery. "Then," he said, "let us imagine the machine is a black slave. If the master is wise he will set aside an amount for depreciation, so that at the end of a ten year period the slave is paid for. Then the rather striking interrogation presents itself: If that can be one for a black slave, why should it not be done for a white working man?"

He advanced the suggestion that from the profits of industry in prosperous times a reserve should be set aside to take care of unemployment. Anticipating the criticism that business could not stand such a burden if it is to compete with other countries, Mr. Euler pointed out that it would be no harder for business to lay aside an amount year by year in good times than to make heavy contributions in taxes in times like these such taxes to be used for the care of the unemployed.

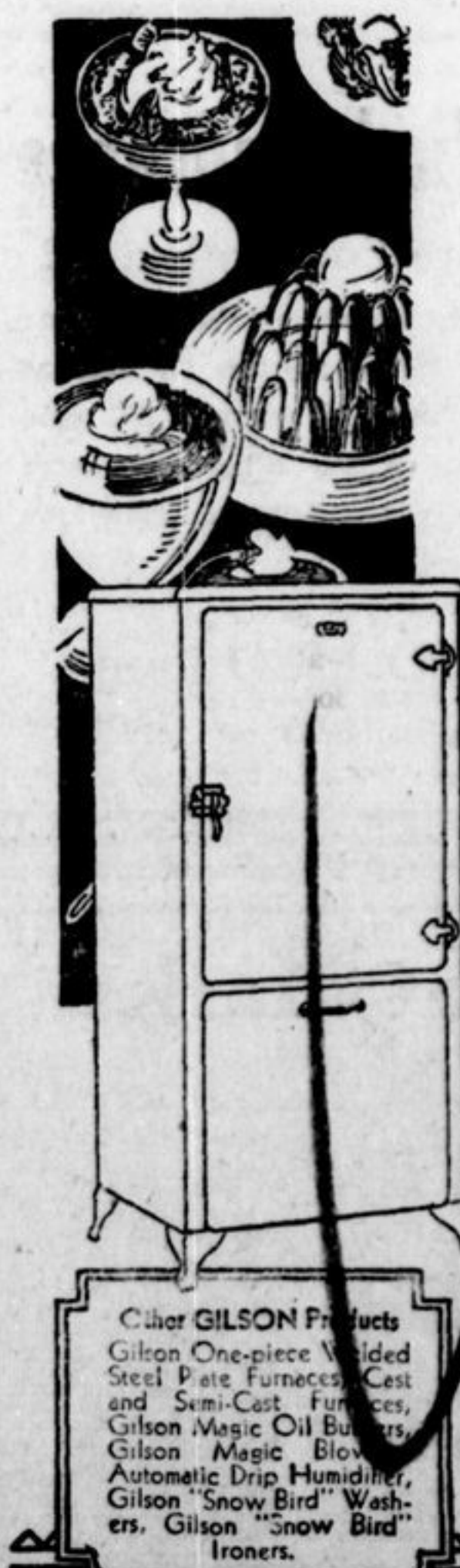
