After her parents' death she took charge of the farm for many years, but finding physical strength failing her heavy farm work, she and two of her sisters moved to Hamilton some eight years ago and supported themselves most creditably since. She was a devout Roman Catholic and was laid to rest after impressive requiem mass was celebrated on Wednesday morning in the cemetery there. Two brothers and five sisters survive, namely, Joseph in Osprey, Edward of Spokane, Wash., Alice and Kate, Hamilton, Agnes, Ella and Emma (Mrs. Davey) in the West.

KEEPING AIR FRESH

There are simple precautions that can be taken to keep the air in the home fresh.
