Some new varieties of vegetables, the value of which have been tested by the Horticultural Division of the Dominion Experimental Farm, are: Bean—Davis White Wax (stringless); Corn—Early Yellow Banting, which has stepped up the season some ten to fifteen days; Eggplant—Blackie, a new variety which as an open field crop produces marketable fruits ready for use by mid-July; Potato—Gold Nugget, a new, early, shallow eyed variety, taking the place of the Irish Cobbler; and Tomato—Abel, a variety originated by the Division of Horticulture and found to be an exceedingly early and good yielder.

ACCIDENTS AND COMPENSATION

During the month of April there were 3,518 accidents reported to the Workmen's Compensation Board, as compared with 3,836 during March, and 4,061 during April a year ago. The fatal cases numbered 23, as against 25 of last April.

The benefits awarded amounted to \$438,164.75, of which \$356,511.88 was for compensation and \$81,652.87 for medical aid. The benefits awarded during April a year ago amounted to \$510,607.55.

In commenting on these figures, R. B. Morley, general manager, Industrial Accident Prevention Associations, calls attention to increased interest in the whole question of accident prevention. He cites as an example of this the fact that there were 1,055 persons registered at the Safety Convention of the Associations in April and that these came from seventy-three different towns and cities, being representative chiefly of the Province of Ontario, although Montreal, and three American Cities, New York, Chicago and Cleveland were included.
