MEASURING GRAIN IN BINS

This is the time of the year when it becomes important to the farmer to know fairly accurately the quantities other use. A rule of thumb for determining the quantity of grain in a bin, which proves very reliable, is supplied by the Dviision of Field Husbandry of the Dominion Experimental Farms. To estimate the amount of grain in a bin multiply the length by the width, by the height of the grain in the bin to paste. determine te capacity in cubic feet and then divide this sum by 114, which will give the contents in bushels. Care must be taken to see that the grain is levelled off to ensure accurate measurement.
