The Precious Picture, which teaches us that we live in deeds, not in years, in thoughts not in days. Man must be self-sacrificing self-denying, and willing to promote good if he wishes to live anyway like God.

Goodness which is not radiant has something the matter with it. Man's relationship in life is at its best when it flowers out into the sense of privilege—the privilege of doing good to someone else. We only realize that we are actually living when we realize that it is a privilege to help others.

Happiness is the real test of the fineness and success of our relationships with our fellows. The man who is happy about life is what Browning calls "A happy tempered bringer of the best out of the worst." He is the man who renders one of the greatest services to humanity.

The conception of the real life is not one which glories in wealth, in social standing, nor one which revels in gloominess, but one which aspires to the highest and noblest thoughts. We must pray to God to fill our hearts and lives with uplifting things that when the end comes our epitaph will not merely be like Methuselah's "and he died," but a real epitaph, "Well done thou good and faithful servant; enter thou into the Kingdom of God."
