News in Brief

Charles G. Dawes said formally at Washington on Monday night that he was not a candidate for the Republican vice-presidential nomination.

Identification was made on Monday of the body of a well-dressed young man taken from the waters of the Welland Canal, Saturday night.

The billion-dollar motion picture industry faces bankruptcy within 90 days unless drastic measures are introduced to save it.

The Montreal Gazette of Tuesday said that prospects of an income tax for provincial and municipal purposes are "looming on the horizon."

At a meeting held on Monday in Stratford between members of the parks board and a representative committee of the Lions Club, it was decided to proceed immediately with the construction of a new bathhouse.

Fire which is believed to have developed in the engine-room of the George Milligan barrel factory at Orillia, completely destroyed that factory on Monday.

When the delegates to the Imperial Conference arrive at Ottawa from all parts of the Empire next month, they will be welcomed to Parliament Hill by a distinctly Canadian police force.

Announcement is made at Cobalt that the post office at Fountain Falls, about 12 miles from Cobalt, has been closed by the department.

This year's expedition to the Eastern Arctic, Baffin Island and Hudson Bay will be undertaken in the S.S. Ungava, which will sail from Montreal on July 9.

Adolf Hitler's storm troops, which were dissolved by the Bruening Government on April 13, on the ground they constituted a "private army" menacing the state, were made legal again in a Government decree issued Tuesday.

The resignation of Carlos G. Davila, one of the outstanding leaders of the Socialist revolution, was accepted early this week in Chile.

Dr. Charles A. Leale, the first surgeon to reach the side of President Lincoln after the president was shot and who remained there until the president's death, died on Monday at his home in New York.

Lidj Jeassu, the former Emperor of Abyssinia, who escaped last week from the captivity in which Emperor Haile Selassie had kept him for 15 years, has been recaptured.

Gaston B. Means, former special investigator of the Department of Justice, at Washington, was found guilty early this week by a jury on two charges of larceny growing out of receipt of \$104,000 from Mrs. Evelyn McLean.

Edward Holmes, alias Fred Townsend, brought from Detroit at the week-end after he had confessed to a \$3,000 jewelry robbery at St. Thomas in August, 1930, was sentenced to serve nine years in Portsmouth Penitentiary by Magistrate Maxwell in St. Thomas on Monday.

Peter Verigin, head of the Doukhobor sect of Canada, will serve 18 months instead of three years in penitentiary.

He was convicted at Yorktown on May 5 of perjury and immediately lodged an appeal.

Mrs. Catharine T. Wheelwright, aged 74, mother of Eamonn de Valera, President of the Irish Free State, died at her home at Rochester, N.Y., on Sunday.

Hundreds of World War veterans trudged through rain and mud into Washington Sunday to join the bonus expeditionary force and demand that Congress pay \$2,000,000,000 in compensation certificates.

The Prince of Wales spent a pleasantly informal day on Sunday among the farmers and huntsmen of Leicestershire, at the county show.

G. W. Ecclestone of Bracebridge, Conservative member in the Ontario Legislature, announced his resignation to the Conservative Association at their annual meeting held at Gravenhurst Saturday, to take effect within the next few days.

Powerless to save all three of the persons who were rapidly sinking to death around him after their light skiff had capsized in Wilcox Lake on Sunday, Jerry Tomson, 23, of 29 Primrose avenue, Toronto, only member of the party who could swim, dived beneath the surface and grasped his wife while his sister-in-law and her friend were drowned.

The Rev. Harold F. Davidson, who recently was tried in Consistory Court in England, on charges of immorality, created an uproar in his own church on Sunday evening when he attempted to resume his duties as rector of Stiffkey.

Attempted jail-break of Norman Joseph Pitre, charged with murder, was foiled last Saturday after he had opened up the wooden floor of his cell and cut through a 14-inch brick wall. Reaching the basement through his self-made passage, Pitre unloosed a fall of brick which aroused Sheriff M. H. Poirier, the jailer.

Overcome with weakness while playing golf on Saturday, Alexander Fraser, chief engineer of the roads department of the Province of Quebec, went to the clubhouse to rest, but was stricken and died within 20 minutes.

An outbreak of banditry in which an overpowering band of liquor thieves wiped out a detachment of guards near Cuenca with a total of 16 dead on both sides, was reported in Ecuador on Sunday.
