INVENTED NEW MATCH

Ferdinand Ringer, an Austrian chemist, has invented a so-called "everlasting" match, for which he refused an offer of approximately \$2,775,000 by the Swedish Match King, Ivar Kreuger. "My 'everlasting' match," Ringer says, "is made of a special substance of my own discovery.

"Matches can be made with it similar in appearance and use to the ordinary safety matches, but with this difference, that they can be used a hundred times. They therefore work out at one-seventieth of the cost of the Swedish match.

"Naturally, match interests are concerned. Hardly a day passes that I do not get dazzling offers for my inven-
