Neat, well balanced sheaves can be obtained by constructing the main sheaf of smaller bundles made from about twenty to thirty straws tied together. The well rounded head is developed by gradually adding small bundle after small bundle and tieing in place as you proceed, the centre bundles being left a bit higher than those towards the margin. The leaves should be stripped off as the bundles are made and the straws cut squarely off at the bottom. The size of the sheaf will depend on the rules of the exhibition but-should not be less than eight inches in diameter.

In order to protect the sheaves during transit, they should be carefully wrapped in heavy brown paper and securely tied in boxes of suitable size.

The threshed grain samples should be delivered in new clean bags and securely tied. Labels bearing the exhibitors' name and address the variety name and exhibit entry number, should be placed both inside and outside the container. An extra tag securely tied to the exhibit often prevents loss and extra trouble.

The large, unsightly webs of the Eastern tent caterpillars are very much in evidence at the present time in many districts of Ontario, the Dominion Entomologist reports. These caterpillars are a common orchard pest and are often abundant on wild cherry, hawthorn and several other species of trees. Unless prompt remedial measures are taken, considerable disfigurement of the trees will inevitably ensue. The following methods of control are recommended:

The caterpillars have the habit of retiring into their tents at night and at certain times of the day. Cut off the tents at such times and destroy the insects either by trampling them under foot or dipping the nests in a bucket of kerosene. This can, of course, be done only when the nests are within easy reach. In higher trees, the webs should be burned by means of a torch made of rags soaked in kerosene and mounted on a long pole. As much care as possible should be taken to avoid scorching the limbs of trees.

If an adequate spraying outfit be available, spray the foliage of the trees with arsenate of lead at the rate of one and one half pounds of powder to 140 gallons of water as soon as the presence of the caterpillars is noticed. If the caterpillars are more than an inch in length the dosage should be increased to two and one half pounds of powder to 40 gallons of water. In small amounts the above dosages come to 1 or 2 tablespoonfuls of poison to a bucket of water.

ever become widely used it must be able FOR TENT CATERPILLARS to produce a satisfactory yield of hay or pasture and plenty of good seed; it must have good feeding quality and be able to resist disease and compete with weeds. It must also be winter-hardy, drought resistant in some areas, and able to mature seed in our comparatively short growing season. Not only do crops differ in these respects but some varieties of the same crop are much more satisfactory than others.

It is clear that accurate knowledge

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to enable farmers to decide what to grow and how it should be grown. This need is being supplied by the Dominion Experimental Farms throughout Canada which are able to give this service by virtue of their excellent facilities and wide experience with farm requirements and varieties of field crops. Plant breeders are always on the lookout for valuable new plants and occasionally a discovery is made, as for example Crested Wheat grass in the Prairie Provinces and Reed Canary grass for certain conditions in Eastern Canada. The standard crops, also, such as alfalfa, red clover and timothy are being improved by selecting, testing, and multiplying the seed from individual plants of special merit.

A POPULAR POTATO

The Netted Gem Potato is a very popular variety on the British Columbia markets. The russet skin and the table quality of the variety are points in its favor. The experimental station at Windermere, B.C., has been endeavoring to produce a new variety possessing similar characteristics, but with a shorter growing season, and increased yields.

Many thousand seedling potatoes have been raised at the station during the past few years both from hand fertilized and naturally fertilized seed. The Netted Gem variety in British Columbia sets seed freely, which has favored the effort of the station. Many of the seedlings raised possess the netted or russet skin, and are sufficiently attractive in other ways as to give hope to the officials of the station that the object sought will be attained in

the near future. The method of procedure has been to plant the seed taken from the seed ball in good soil in the greenhouse about the beginning of April.
