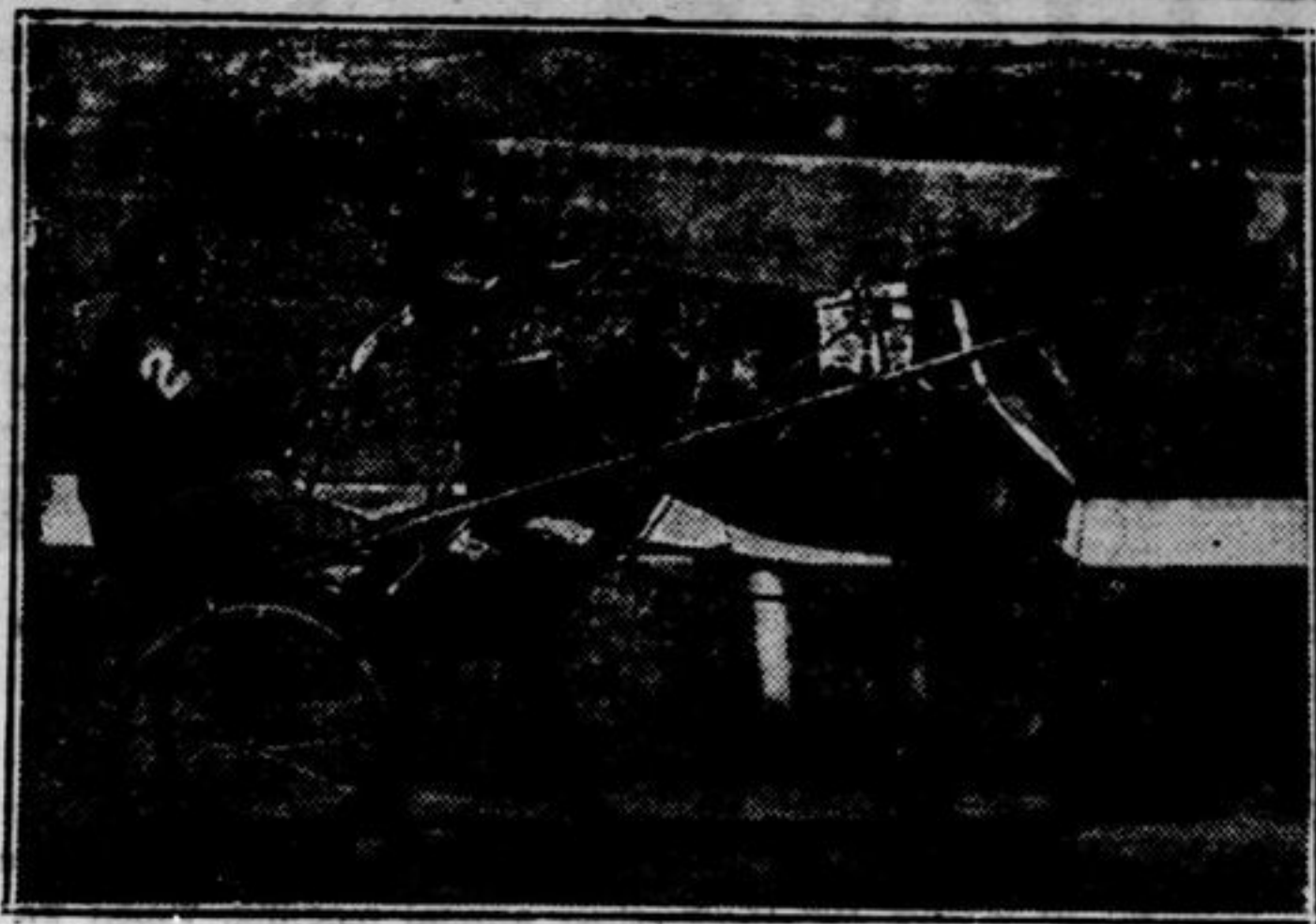
Injured in Accident

Fred Wray and Kenneth Wray are the pair. They gave their place of residence as Tottenham and last week the former was let go on suspended sentence from one of the Toronto police courts. With this pair the provincial officer also picked up Mike Simis. The most serious offence with which any of these men will be charged is that of converting a 1931 motor license plate into a 1932 one. News in Brief

Interesting Happenings Briefly Outlined for the Busy Readers

Ontario provincial police on Sunday were holding the body of Frank G. Hamilton, 47, Fort Wayne, Ind., publisher, who, they said, committed suicide yesterday at his summer cottage on Lake Pinage near Espanola, Ont. The body was found in the cottage by the caretaker. A bullet hole extended from the mouth to the back of the head.

A hundred reducing tablets taken in three weeks, to cut his weight for a mystery non-stop flight to England, wrecked the life of Wilbert Clayton Hyatt, youthful mechanical wizard, whose body was taken from Windsor to his home in London.

The body of George Elmitt, 24, was brought to North Bay on Sunday from Kirkiand Lake after being recovered from the bottom of a 30-foot dump into which the young man had fallen.

A sudden intensification of political activity on the part of German monarchists and renewed Fascist demands for peremptory suppression of the Communist party further complicated internal troubles on Monday after a week-end of sporadic violence in many cities.

The Southern Pacific Railroad in Mexico was completely tied up Monday afternoon when 3,500 employees went on strike after negotiations for a settlement had failed.

Lifesavers late Monday night recovered the body of Stanley J. McCaffery, 35, of Toronto, from the lake at the foot of Lee avenue in that city, and were dragging for another unidentified man, and possibly a woman, all believed to have been drowned from a canoe.

A committee of technical experts was formed on Monday to push construction of the projected tunnel under the Strait of Gibraltar.

Apparently believing that wild turnip or Jack-in-the-Pulpit was good for eating, Cyril Marvin, young son of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Marvin of Burr's, near Belleville, is seriously ill at his home as a result of having eaten several.

A school teacher and a 12-year-old boy were drowned in a flood following a six-inch rain in Southwest Missouri Monday night.

Life suspension was imposed on Jockey W. Brown at a special meeting of the Western Canada Thoroughbred Racing Association in Winnipeg on Monday. The sentence was handed down for foul riding, it being charged that Brown used a battery on his mount in the fourth race Saturday at Polo Park.

Ontario's Government, or the Ontario Hydro-Electric system, is to take over, on equitable terms yet to be negotiated, the Abitibi Canyon power development project, as a result of the financial difficulties of the Ontario Power Service Corporation, which finds it impossible to secure some \$5,000,000 necessary to complete the development.

Hider: in a bunch of bananas and surviving a frigid ride in a refrigerator car, a tarantula made its first public appearance since leaving its native land in Kresge's King street east store, Hamilton, last Friday.

The Government and the royal family of Siam were in the hands of revolutionaries Saturday after an uprising led by army and navy officers.

Announcement that a fleet of cars will be brought into the Capital for the use of the delegates to the Imperial Conference has aroused Ottawa taxi drivers to heated protest.

Catholic pilgrims on their way to and from the Eucharistic Congress at Dublin were stoned on Sunday in various parts of Northern Ireland in an outburst of apparently anti-Catholic attacks which caused many injuries.

Charlie Chaplin, the comedian, turned economist on Sunday with announcement of an international bi-metallic scheme, which he claimed would settle war debts, revive America's foreign trade and hasten the recovery of world commerce.

E. E. Ratz, former mayor of Kitchener, his wife, and Mrs. Charles Beese, were injured on Monday when the car driven by Mr. Ratz skidded on a slippery pavement three miles from Fergus and turned over in the ditch.

Lady Eaton of Toronto, back in Canada only two weeks, after an extended visit abroad, told an interviewer in Winnipeg Monday that Canada is doing too much worrying about the depression.

"If worry could clear up present world conditions it would have been accomplished in 1929," she said. "I have heard more about the disastrous condition of affairs throughout the world in my two weeks back in Canada than I heard in my entire stay in England, France and Italy. And it is Europe that has cause to be depressed."

A demonstration against prohibition involving a fist fight and the upsetting of some lady delegates, the announcement by Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt, candidate for the United States presidential nomination that he would call off his forces seeking to abrogate the two-thirds nomination rule; these were the features of the Democratic National Convention getting under way in Chicago on Monday all smiles and determination to defeat President Herbert Hoover.

Carrick Farmer Ends Life

The whole community was astounded on Monday by the news that Mr. William H. Rehkopf, a respected farmer of the 12th concession of Carrick, had ended his life by hanging. Mr. Rehkopf had not been in good health for some weeks, and this condition, together with his deep concern as to his ability to arrange his finances for this period of depression, preyed upon his mentality. On Monday morning he went out for the cows, after which he went into the orchard, where a short time later his body was found suspended from an apple tree. The coroner was called, and decided an inquest was not necessary. Mr. Rehkopf was in his 60th year, and was very favorably regarded by all his neighbors and acquaintances. He was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Henry Rehkopf of Normanby, and had been living on lot 24, concession 12, Carrick, for the past 31 years. He was a fine farmer, a good neighbor, and very honorable in all his business affairs. He was in fairly comfortable circumstances, and enjoyed the fullest confidence of all who knew him. His tragic death was a sad blow to his mourning family.

He is survived by his widow, one son, Alvin, of Buffalo, and two daughters (Emma) Mrs. Alvin Schenk of Normanby and Miss Edna at home. He is also survived by six brothers and seven sisters. The funeral took place on Wednesday afternoon to the Lutheran cemetery on the 10th concession of Carrick.—Mildmay Gazette.

Taken to Guelph for Observation

A case of what appears to be mental aberration gave our police force and others some trouble for a few days the past week. A woman who, according to her own story, was a widow with one child, and who had walked here from Montreal, kept house for a farmer out Pike Lake way, but caused so much trouble that she was brought to town. Chief Flynn was put on her track Saturday night. When he accosted her she collapsed, and the Chief carried her to a doctor's, who, in turn, put her in care of the hospital, where she remained unconscious for some hours. On Sunday she improved, and on Monday the Provincial Police were notified at Palmerston. He came over and, assisted by Chief Flynn, took her to Guelph where she was to remain in custody for inquiry and observation.—Mount Forest Confederate.
