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ESKIMOS' IMPEDIMENTA

A great deal of genuine interest was shown in an exhibition of Eskimo life, shown at Montreal. There were specimens to tools and weapons, ancient and modern, made use of in the Arctic regions. There were snow glasses made of wood with small slits for vision; curious drills which the Eskimo holds in his teeth while he presses the point into the ground or the ice; a leather belt with an ivory buckle; fine comb delicately carved out of ivory; ivory needles and toys; carved miniatures of bears, walrus and seals; ivory rattles and draughts.
