MacArthur Families Held Reunion

Gathered at Bunesan Saturday, When Pleasant Time Was Spent in Games and Renewing Old Friendships—Members Present From Over Wide Area.

On Saturday last, July 2, a reunion of the MacArthur families and descendants was held at Bunesan school, Glenelg. The day, being rather unfavorable in the morning, turned out fair in the afternoon and evening although somewhat cool.

A crowd numbering about 175 gathered together and took part in various sports and games, the younger members playing ball, horse-shoe, etc., while the older ones spent the afternoon in social chat and renewing friendships. Pipers Cameron and McCormick livened up the afternoon with bagpipe music, which was much enjoyed. A short program, presided over by Mr. A. E. MacArthur, of the Glen, was rendered, consisting of music by the pipers, and by Messrs. Leonard McKeown, Allan McInnes and Dan L. MacArthur; step-dancing by Dan McGrath, of Williamsford and Scotch songs by Stewart MacArthur, after which the gathering partook of a sumptuous supper.

The evening was spent in dancing, a splendid platform being provided and kept well occupied.

The family genealogy runs as follows:

Colin MacArthur and his wife, Catharine McEachnie, came from the Isle of Mull, Argyshire, Scotland, in the year 1830, and settled in the township of Vaughan. Later, about 1843, they came to what is now Durham and settled on the farm now occupied by their grandson, Mr. Angus MacArthur, on the Garafraxa Road. Their family consisted of six sons and five daughters, who settled later as follows: John, at Sault Ste. Marie; Donald, on the Garafraxa Road, north of Durham; Alex., in Cleveland, Ohio; Archie, who died young; Neil, in Detroit; Colin, who died at 25 years; Janet, unmarried; Kate, Mrs. Ailan Cameron, Glenelg; Annie, Mrs. John Woods, later of Parry Sound; Mary, Mrs. Hunter, near Toronto; Margaret, Mrs. Leonard, Muskoka.

To Allan Cameron and Kate MacArthur were born Kate, Janet, Margaret (Mrs. Coutts), Effie (Mrs. McKinnon), of Bentinck, who was the mother of the late Mrs. Andrew Milne, of Elmwood, and the late Mrs. Jas. McDougall of Crawford; Robert, all deceased.

To John Woods and Annie MacArthur were born Thomas, William, Kate, Alex., John, George, Colin and Margaret, all of Parry Sound.

To David Hunter and Mary MacArthur were born Mary (Mrs. Swanton); deceased; Margaret (Mrs. Thompson); Kate (Mrs. Ross, of Toronto); Fred, deceased; Sarah (Mrs. Angus MacArthur), Durham; Annie, (Mrs. Hill), deceased; Alfred, deceased.

Donald remained on the farm now occupied by his grandson, Stewart and married Merron MacArthur, a daughter of Donald MacArthur and Mary McKinnon. Although of the same name there was little or no blood relation between the two families. To them were born seven sons and one daughter: John, of Aberdeen, who died in 1907; Mary Ann (Mrs. Thos. Banks), of Durham; Donald, of Durham; Colin, of North Glenelg; Angus, north of Durham; Neil John, of Vancouver, and two sons who died in childbirth.

On the other side, the above mentioned Donald MacArthur and Mary McKinnon (who also came from the Isle of Mull in 1849 and settled in Vaughan for a few years before coming to the homestead, on the Durham Road, later occupied by their son, Charles) were born four sons and four daughters: Archie, Charles, John, Dan, Kate, Merron, Mary and Annabella.

Archie, who was married to Miss Annie Black, was killed early in life by a falling tree, but to them had been born two sons and one daughter: John, deceased; Dan, in Dauphin, Man., Mary (Mrs. Rigney), of Sarnia, deceased.

Charles, was married to Miss Mary Fisher and their family consisted of Annie deceased; Mary, Mrs. Farrow; Sarah, Mrs. Ries, both of Niagara Falls, N.Y.; Elizabeth, Mrs. Sutherland, of Sarnia; Archie, deceased, and Kate, Mrs. D. Gibson Kitchener.

John was married to Miss Isabella Black and to them were born five sons and one daughter: John, of Timmins, deceased; Archie B., of the Glen; Dan, deceased; Alex., of Halleybury; Angus, of the Glen and Mary, Mrs. Thos. White, Toronto, deceased.

Dan was married to his deceased brother, Archie's widow, and their family consisted of Archie W., of Aberdeen, and Christina (Mrs. Paige), deceased.

Kate was the second wife of Allan Cameron and their family consisted of Angus, John, Mary, Isabella, Dan, Annie Christina (Mrs. Legard); Kate and Sarah, of which only Annie (Mrs. Malcolm McMillan), survives. An account

of their family is given above in the first part.

Mary was married to Archie MacArthur, a member of a Bruce County family, and to them were born the following: Mary (Mrs. John Moffat), deceased; Kate (Mrs. Duffield), Guelph; Isabel (Mrs. Jos. Firth), Durham; Sarah (Mrs. Spittle), deceased; Dan J., of the Glen; John, of Sask.; Annie (Mrs. Haughtby), London.

Annabella was married to John McFarlane and their family consisted of Dan, Margaret, Mary, deceased; Annie and Sarah, in Toronto; Neil, Kate and Bella, deceased.

The descendants of these pioneer families are proud of their ancestors and have gathered together to pay tribute to the memory of those who came into the wilderness to hew out the homes which we enjoy today. Friendships and acquaintances have been renewed and memories of olden days brought to light. The oldest living member is Mrs. Thos. Banks of Durham, who is in her 76th year.
