**IS NEW SUPERINTENDENT AT SUMMERLAND STATION**

Confirmation of the appointment of R. C. Palmer to the position of Superintendent of the Dominion Experimental Station at Summerland, B.C., with effect from June 1, 1932, is announced by Dr. E. S. Archibald, Director of Experimental Farms.

Mr. Palmer's appointment comes as a well merited promotion following eleven years of work at the Summerland Station. He is a graduate of the University of British Columbia with the degree of B.S.A. (1921) and M.S.A. (1923). He was awarded the Returned Soldier's Scholarship in 1920 and 1921, and the gold medal for efficiency in 1921.

During the past year Mr. Palmer has been at the East Malling research station, East Malling, England, where he has specialized in horticultural research along lines of special application to the Province of British Columbia.

**INCREASE BACON EXPORTS**

An increase of 5,739,000 lbs. or nearly 285 per cent., was shown in the export sales of Canadian bacon and ham to all countries for the first quarter of this year. Sales this year amounted to 7,752,000 lbs., as compared with 2,013,000 lbs. in the first three months of 1931. For the week ended June 10 the price of Canadian bacon in the British market ranged from 54 to 58 shillings per long cwt. An average price which was second only to the Irish product.
