Glenelg Council

Council met in Township Hall, on Saturday, Sept. 3, 1932, for general business. Members all present. Minutes read and adopted. By-laws Nos. 754 and 755 were passed. No. 754 provides for the levying of rates to meet the current expenses and liabilities of the Township for the current year as follows:

County Rate 11 mills, Township rate 6 5-10 mills, General school rate 7 mills, Total General Rate 24 5-10 mills.

School Trustee Rates as follows: No. 1 none; No. 3, Edgemoor, 1 mill; No. 4, 2-4-10 mills; No. 5, Zion, 2-10 mills; No. 6, none; No. 9, 1 7-10 mills; D. P. S. 9 5-10 mills; M. P. S. 11 mills; U. No. 2, B. & G., 3 mills; U. No. 3, G. & B., none; U. No. 12, 4 mills; U. No. 16, A. & G., 2 6-10 mills; U. No. 18, G. & A., 5 1-10 mills; Sep. No. 3, 13 2-10 mills; Sep. No. 5, 6 4-10 mills; Sep. No. 7, 8 8-10 mills.

Bylaw No. 755 provides for a discount of one per cent to be allowed on all taxes paid on or before Nov. 10, 1932 and three per cent to be added to all taxes remaining unpaid after December 24, 1932.

McGirr-McKechnie: That Commissioners be paid for committee work as follows: John McKechnie, one half day \$1.25; S. H. The Treasurer and Road Superintendent were appointed a committee to meet representatives of Egremont and Artemesia Councils re equalization of expenditures on the respective townships.

McGirr-McKechnie: That this Council purchase from Wm. Banks two cords of hardwood, 20 inches long at \$3.00 per cord for use of hall, and that two cords of cedar be purchased from Robt. Peart at \$2.00 per cord. Carried.

Mr. M. Black presented Voucher No. 8 for road improvements amounting to \$583.68, which was passed and payments made accordingly. A letter was read from A. E. Wilson & Co., Ltd. regarding claim of W. J. Vollett, Durham, for repairs to truck by reason of a hole in the road on Baseline, north of the 10th Concession. Wilson and Co. claimed that claim had not been presented within the ten days prescribed and should therefore be disallowed.

Council adjourned to October 1, 1932. H. H. MacDonald, Clerk.
