CANADA'S SEED INDUSTRY

The seed growing industry in Canada now embraces the production and imrovement of approved varieties of cereals of pedigreed stock, the production of forage crop seeds, and the production of field root, garden vegetable, and flower seeds. It is estimated that in 1931 3,710 farms were producing seed crops subject to federal inspection, and around 12,000 persons were engaged in the production and marketing of the improved seed.

EMBARGO AFFECTS PRAIRIES
