COCKEREL DISTRIBUTION POLICY

Important changes have been made in the provisions of the Cockerel Distribution Policy introduced by the Hon. Mr. Weir last year, with a view to making it more effectively available for the 1933 poultry breeding season. This year negotiations for the purchase or sale of birds must be direct between the parties interested. The Department on the presentation by the purchaser of a Declaration Form properly completed, refunds \$1.25 of the purchase price for the birds. Where male birds purchased under the policy move in lots of ten or more the Department supplies the seller with a Transportation Order Form, which is authority to the railway company concerned to charge the full cost of transportation directly to the Department at Ottawa. Detailed information about the policy may be obtained by writing to the Senior Poultry Promoter in your Province or to the Poultry Division of the Dominion Livestock Branch, Ottawa.
