Special attention is called to the following notice issued by the Dominion Fruit Branch:

"Exporters of fresh, dried, and canned fruits and vegetables are advised that all shipments must be accompanied by a certificate of origin to enable the British importer to claim the Preferential rate of duty. Failure to comply with this regulation necessitates' the payment of duty before the fruit is released by the British Custom authorities.

"Attention is directed to the Fruit Export Regulations under which no apples, pears or plums may be exported unless the fruit has been inspected at port of shipment and a certificate issued stating that the fruit complies with all the requirements of the Fruit Act and is of the grade designated."
