Mr. Coote made an interesting observation regarding the capturing of the British bacon market by the Danes: he stated that when Denmark elbowed 9.8.tf. us out of the British bacon market some years ago, the British pound sterling was at that time worth more in Denmark then in Canada, thus giving the Danish exporter an advantage over us. and coming to the condition of today, Mr. Coote said: "I believe that if our Canadian farmers are to take advantage of the market which has been provided for them they should be given a chance to compete. It seems to me that if we are to give them chance we must bring the British pound back to parity in Canada, that is, it must be worth \$4.86 2-3. Fortunately Mr. and Mrs. S.
