A NEW FERTILIZER PAMPHLET

The Dominion Seed Branch call attention to the fact that there has recently been published by the Provincial Department of Agriculture for the Province of Quebec, recommendations to fertilizer manufacturers and to farmers of the province as to fertilizer formulae best suited to the various soils and crops.

These recommendations are the result of two conferences called this year at Montreal at which were present Provincial and Federal technicians and representatives of the fertilizer manufacturers who sell within the province. The object of the conference was to reduce the number of formulae of fertilizers on the market in order to prevent unnecessary confusion in the minds of the farmers and other users of fertilizer who are not familiar with fertilizer technique, and to eliminate unnecessary formulae, the manufacture of which simply adds to the cost which the farmer ultimately must bear.

This action on the part of the Quebec Fertilizer Board is to be highly commended as it should help the farmer to choose the most suitable and most profitable fertilizers for his particular use and at the same time keep fertilizer costs down to the lowest possible level.

The French edition of the recommendation is an attractive pamphlet under the title "L'Emploi raisonne des Engrais chimiques." The English edition is in mimeographed form under the title "Recommendations of the Provincial Fertilizer Board."

Farmers in Quebec should apply for a copy to the Provincial Department of Agriculture, Quebec, P.Q.

NEWSPAPERS YOU CANT BUY

There are, printed and published in London, England, two daily newspapers—one morning and one afternoon—that the public cannot buy.

The Morning Report is the morning daily. Printed Information the afternoon paper. Both are illustrated with photographs, and both are published and printed in a newspaper office which is housed within the precincts of Scotland Yard.

These papers—under the headlines, "Wanted for Crime," "In Custody for Crime," "Property Stolen," "Persons or Bodies Found," "Persons Missing"—contain all the latest news likely to be of assistance to the police.

They are conveyed from the office in Scotland Yard to all police stations in small, green, closer motor cars, very similar to the ordinary newspaper vans. Others are mailed to the more distant points of the United Kingdom, and read eagerly by their recipients. Thousands of criminals have been caught by their aid.

These papers, however, do not represent the entire activities by that unknown office.

The famous Police Gazette is another publication which is distributed twice a week to the police chiefs of all the big cities in the whole of the British empire.

It has correspondents all over the world, and like the others, is well illustrated with photographs. It is published on Tuesdays and Fridays the first half of the week being devoted to deserters from the army and the navy; the second half exclusively to crime and criminals.

Then there is the Illustrated Circular. This contains a full account of the movements of criminals.

Supposing a thief leaves Manchester for Sheffield. The chief constable at Manchester wires the Illustrated Circular. The chief constable at Sheffield reads the news that "Sam Smith, alias 'The Piper,' alias 'Slim Sam,' has left Manchester for Sheffield. Specialty robbing safes." And if shortly afterwards there is a safe robbery he has definite clues to work on.

Stolen property is catered for by the Pawnbrokers' List and the Cycle List; and even the habitual drunkards are not left out in the cold. The Black List which goes to every public house and hotel proprietor, contains the names and photographs of those to whom it is forbidden to sell liquor. Crooks just released from prison figure largely in the Weekly List of habitual criminals.

This unique and almost unknown newspaper office, with its editor, sub-editors, reporters and pressers, is kept fairly busy.—Pearson's Weekly.

Problem of Nature

Ants, bees and wasps are the world's dominant insects. Weaker members of the family often resemble the powerful stingers. Birds feed quite freely on both wasps and bees. Ants constitute a favorite food of toads. These batrachians also dine freely on yellow jackets and wasps. Mice, weasels, foxes and badgers ravage the nests of bumble bees. Skunks dig out nests of yellow jackets. Bears plunder the homes of honey bees and hornets. Yet the members of this family are regarded as the most highly protected of all insects and weaker members of the insect race apparently imitate them. To what purpose, has been asked.
