1,000,000 Pounds of Turkey Shipped to Great Britain

Field Crops Report

The Statistic Branch has recently issued its sixth crop report of the season, covering yields field crops for Ontario. Fall wheat yield per acre is now placed at 28.4 bushels...

Late crops such as sugar beets, turnips, mangolds, corn and buckwheat benefited from very favourable growing weather during the fall...

Hay and clover crops yielded well except in the east where growth was checked by midsummer droughts...

Farmers generally sowed fall wheat later this fall to avoid the danger of Hessian Fly. Though having less top than last year, it is very healthy and goes into the winter in good shape...

During November there were 3,227 accidents reported to the Workmen's Compensation Board, a decrease of 115 from the number reported during October...
