The driver said he did not see the child as he drove down county road 1, a half mile west of Walkerton. Mr Hudson said, "I thought I heard a thump and then saw through my mirror that there was something on the road that wasn't there when I came."

The driver stopped, found the injured child and carried her into her home. She died in Victoria Hospital, London, from head

The child was lying on the edge of the pavement just three feet east of the driveway to her farm Mrs Eugene Zettler of Walker-

ton who was in the parking lot of the golf course across from the victim's home said she saw the child alone, walking out of the driveway. The truck was being driven in a normal manner, she

said. Mrs Zettler said she did not

see the impact. The child had been alone on the road one week before her death, Michael Kennedy of Walkerton said. She darted across the highway and then back and Mr Kennedy's wife carried the child to its home where she was placed in a snow fence enclosure on the
