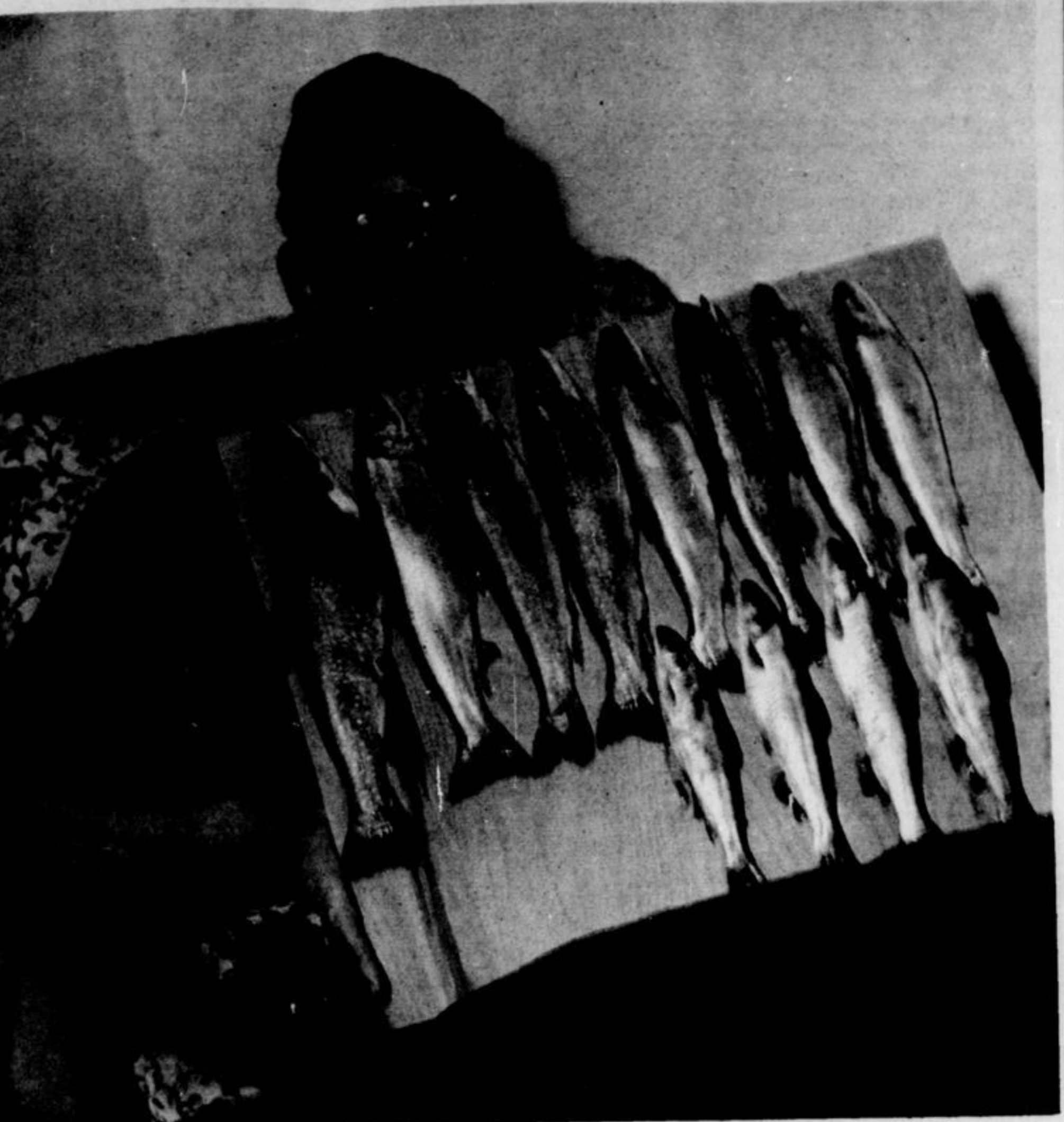

Conron, Wingham; youth and recreation consultant, Pat McGarrity, Hanover. Executive members are Donald Eagles, Meaford; Harold Schenk, Normanby; Ted Stoddart of Flesherton.

There were 55 present at the conference representing 21 communities.

Guest speakers were Robert Secord, director of the youth and recreation branch, Ontario Department of Education, Toronto; Eric Winkler, M.P.P. Grey South, and David Phillips, Co-ordinator of extension Georgian College of Applied Arts and Technology.

Mr Secord said, "The time is coming when we will be judged not by the work we do but by how we spend our leisure time. We must start now to train for that leisure time."

Schools are the greatest asset to community recreation programs and should be available whenever needed, he added.

**PLAN IN REGIONS**

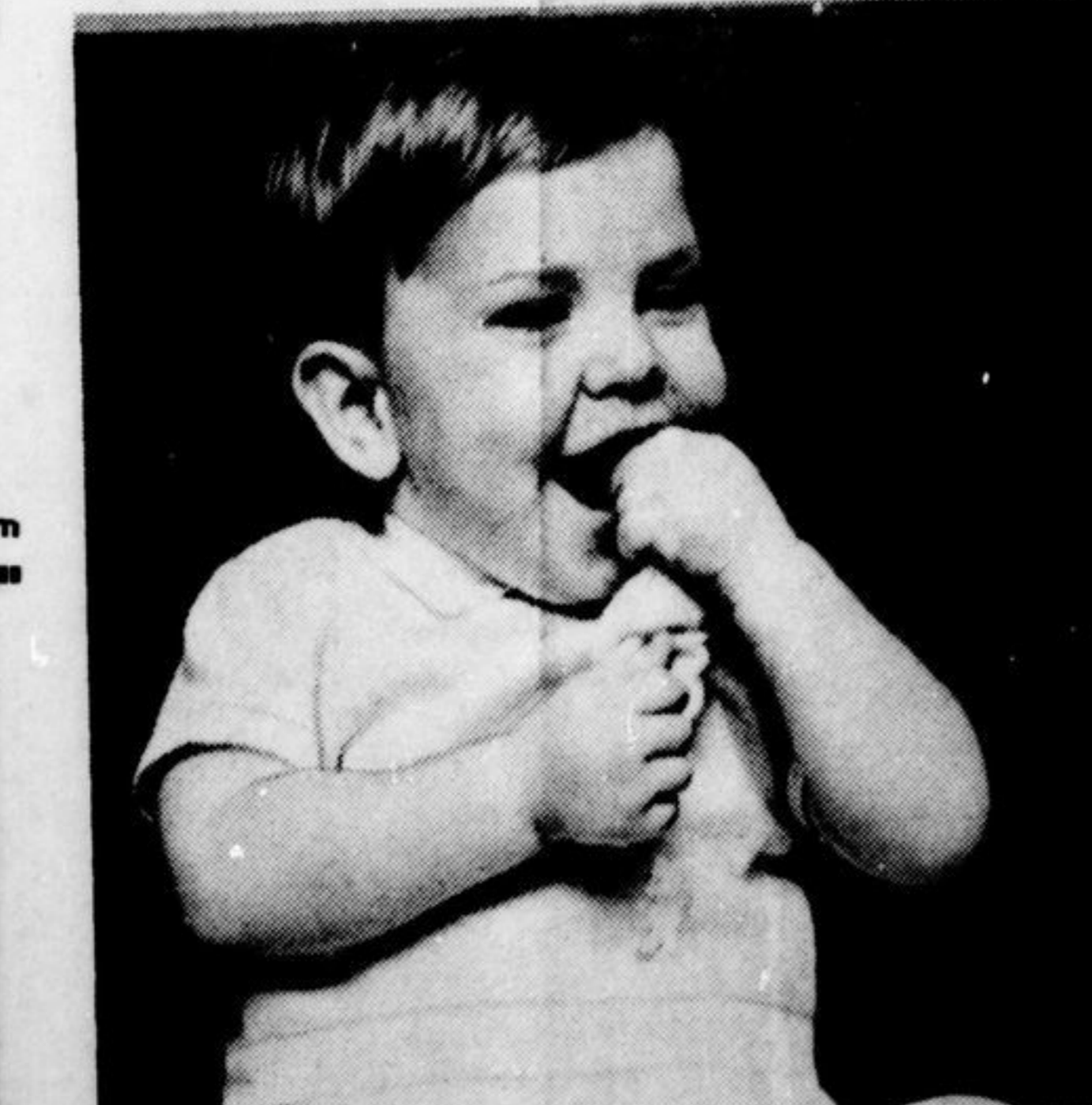
