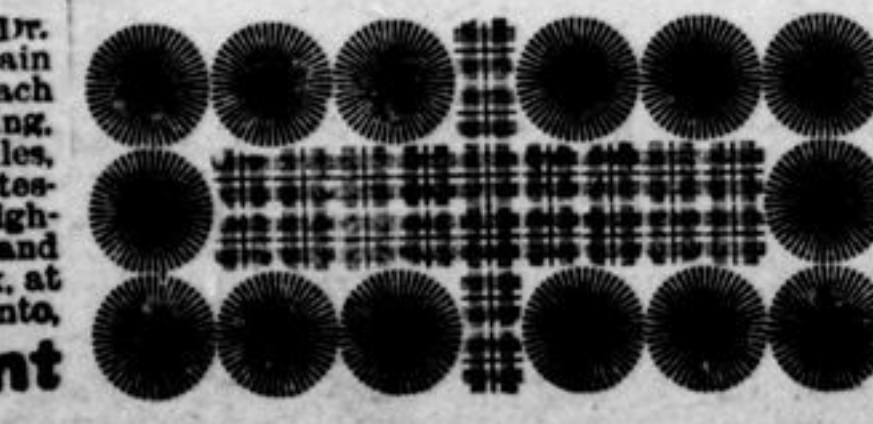

The Council met Dec. 15th, pursuant to statute. All the members present. The Reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. Communications and accounts read as follows: From commissioner for ward 4, report of road expenditures; from Jno. McArthur asking for a re-fund of taxes on account of loss by fire; from Thos. Davis certificate of statute labor having been performed for lots 7 and 8, con. 3 N. D. R.; from Jas. Edge report of local board of health; from the Municipal World an account for election stationery; and from Robert Mathews a gravel certificate.

Arrowsmith—Firth—That the following persons be exempt from land taxes for 1900, namely: Alice Flynn, Mrs. O'Hearn, Mrs. Dillon, Mrs. Ginn and Mrs. Cameron.—Carried.

McCannel—Firth—That the account of the Municipal World for election stationery and forms amounting to \$7.22 be paid.—Carried.

Firth—McInnis—That cheques be issued in favor of the several school boards for the several amounts due them amounting in the whole to the sum of \$4062.78.—Carried.

Arrowsmith—McInnis—That the report of the Local Board of Health be adopted and that the expenses amounting to \$20 be paid.—Carried.

Firth—Arrowsmith—That the following gavel accounts be paid, viz.: Walter Nichol, \$4.00; Chas. McArthur, \$2.00; William Britton, \$4.50.—Carried.

Arrowsmith—McInnis—That Chas. Sewell be paid 50 cents for removing a tree off the road at lot 27, con. 9, and Colin McArthur and Thos. Glen-cross be paid \$1.00 each for cutting trees off the road on base line.—Carried.

Firth—Arrowsmith—That M. McMillan be paid \$7.50 for building culverts at lot 16, D. R. also Robt. Edge \$2.50 for repairing bridge at lot 3 of 18, G. R., also Thos. Russell \$6.75 for 4 1/2 cords of wood for Mrs. Dillon.—Carried.

Firth—McCannel—That the Clerk be paid \$10 on salary \$10 for preparing Minutes for publication, 45 cents for express charges, 84 cents for postage and 88 cents for oil for hall, total \$21.67.—Carried.

Firth—Arrowsmith—That this Council instruct the Commissioner for ward 4 to refund to the Treasurer the sum of \$30 being the amount drawn by the said Commissioner under cheques Nos. 1718 and 1719 as said amount had previously been paid on orders issued by the said commissioner.—Carried.

McCannel—Firth—That the report of the Commissioner for ward 4 as now read be adopted and that cheques issue on the Treasurer for the several sums therein contained.—Carried.

Lochead, travelling lots 7 and 8, con. 2, \$20.30; Wm. Kenny, grading and travelling lots 35 and 36, con. 3, \$8.55; A. Dittner, travelling lot 11, con. 13, \$3.60; Jos. Boyle, stoning townline 1/2 cost, \$4.37; James Wilson, travelling lot 18, con. 2, 50 cents; Jas. Ellison, ditching lot 16, con 3, E., 25 cents; Wm. Dormer, cutting trees baseline, \$2.00; Wm. Dormer, travelling lot 4, con 10, \$14.50; Total appropriation, \$100.17.

The Council adjourned to Monday the 17th.

Monday, Dec. 17, 1900.—The Council met pursuant to adjournment, all the members present. The Financial Statement for the year up to December 15th was submitted and examined.

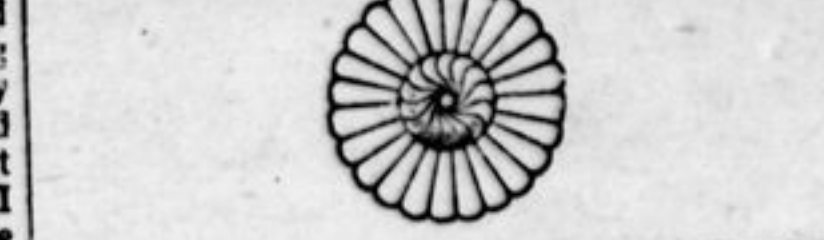
