

ADDRESS.

Mr. R. N. Henderson's delivered Speech at the Nominations at Flesherston.

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Now, gentlemen, some of you will perhaps say I am talking nonsense, but I have as much right to talk nonsense as any of these other fellows have; and much of the talking done on this platform on nomination days is nonsense. I see my friend Grainger here, and I think he should have been in the swim to-day. He once ran for councillor, and I am confident would have been elected had he received enough votes.

I am pleased we have with us to-day, and again in the fight, our old War Horse, the G. O. M. Mr. Kells, whose eloquence has doubtless pleased you all. I once asked a Reformer whether he liked better to listen to Mr. Laurier or Mr. Kells, and he said of the two he thought he preferred Laurier, but you see he was a Grit and that accounts for it. I hope, gentlemen, next to myself, to see Mr. Kells elected because we could pull well together. I could help him pull special grants for his ward, and then he would help me pull for mine. He's a grand man on the pull, and the finest road and culvert builder in the county. Further, gentlemen, I notice that in the financial statement of the firm of Lucas, Wright & McArdle does not figure for large legal fees, and this, I understand, is because my friend, Mr. Kells, has been acting solicitor for the township.

In conclusion, gentlemen, I may say that my friends have discovered that I cannot qualify at present to represent you at this table, but I can still lend you money at four and a half per cent., and I assure you that when the assessor on his rounds calls, which he has not done for eight years, I shall see to it that my qualifications are made good and sufficient to entitle me to occupy the position of honor you so much desire that I should. The election for Councillors on Monday, Jan. 7th, 1901, for the township of Artemesia, resulted as follows:—John A. Boyd 373; Alex. Muir, 363; Geo. Thompson, 271; Jos. Gibson, 273. D. McTavish, receive accl. Jas. Best, 232; T. Kells, 217; W. J. Henderson, 202. The old council thus remains the same with the exception of the old veteran, Mr. Kells, who is replaced by Mr. Gibson. We hoped to have seen old friend Kells hold his seat, but the fortunes of war were against him. He has been a useful man at the Council Board, and will be missed. Our representative from this side of the division has held his own, although we believe that some worked hard against him. Past records count, and we don't take much stock in grumblers. We hope to see this council put up a good record, and we know that Mr. Boyd will hold his own against the coalition which he raked up on nomination day. There was war bloodless, but none the less war, at the nominations for reeve, and council at Flesherston on Dec. 31, 1900. Mr. J. A. Boyd in replying to criticism of the old council by the Czar of Flesherston, Dr. Christoe, gave him the best trouncing he has had for some time. Of course according to the Doctor, any Council Board without him at its head, was practically useless, but when Mr. Boyd got through with him, we think his opinion must have been shaken. One thing we do know and that is the majority of the audience have shown, by placing Mr. Boyd at the top of the Poll, that their faith in the Czar's great abilities is dead, or at least seriously sick. If the new elected council know what is good for them they will try to stand on their own feet, and not act the part of jumping jacks moving only when the Czar pulls the strings—a word to the wise is sufficient.

A man may be known to be a counterfeiter or illicit distiller in his own house, but if nobody enters a formal and legal complaint of the fact, the newspaper is assuming great risk if it proceeds to state the fact to the world without this preliminary complaint having been made. People sometimes censure newspapers for what they deem deliberate ignoring of palpable truths and facts, when in reality the newspaper has no more legal right to recognize these facts than if they did not or had never existed. It may be accepted by the public as an assured thing that every newspaper is willing and anxious to publish all the information it properly, legally and truthfully can.—St. Thomas Times.
