PHILLIPINE ISLANDS

San Nicholas, Cebu P. I. December 30th, 1900,

MY DEAR FATHER, No doubt you are often put out by receiving letters at one time from San Nicolas and at another from Cebu, so I may as well tell you how it is. San Nicolas is a sub-post of Cebu and although another city, is separated only by a bridge. It is a much larger place but not nearly so important, and the post office is in Celu. At times when I keep my wits about me I start my letters properly, but others I do not for the for prenting. moment think and rattle off any thing.

It is reported on the Island that Gen. McArthur has received orders to put a speedy stop to the rebellion, and if this is correct we will soon be looking for blood and thunder in the mountains I hope it is to be, for am tired of being kept on pins and needles and expect to get my light put out at any moment. Our Company has received strict orders to show no lenience or give no quarter to any native carrying concealed weapons and who should happen to be caught by any detachment or patrol. Of course we cannot shoot them down in cold blood, but you know we can pursuade them to run to escape. Any native you shoot you are to secure his knife, bolo or what ever it is and produce it at the court and you will be exonerated from all blame. Once in a while a native is killed around here for causes unknown, but he is generally killed for running away when he is commanded to \$5.25 be paid .- Carried. to "Halt." If that order turns out good about Gen. McArthur we will have a little hell on wheels travelling through Cebu.

Christmas eve a detachment went out consisting of eight or ten men, I do not know which. We marched across some rice paddies and ran into a couple of shacks and captured about 100 rounds of Mauser ammunition and a Remington re-loading outfit We searched around for a while and found two natives hiding behind some women's clothes. Of course we took them prisoners and after a little further search marched off About half a mile from there we saw about dozen natives running through the rice field and opened upon them. but blood was found on the trail. In the meantime our own two niggers. thinking our attention was turned away from them took a friendly sneak. But they were watched, and had got about fifty yards when we balls into them. They stopped. One nigger was disfigured in fine shape and I don't believe I ever saw better to him. Well, did you have a better Christmas Eve in Durham?

Christmas morning broke fine and clear, and although it rained some in the morning it did not hurt the day's fun. I was room orderly that day and had to keep the quarters in good shape. After I got through with my morning's work three more of us took a sam-pin, a native boat, and went off to Mactare Island about four miles straight across the bay, to look for star-fish and shells. We got over a. m. all right but as I was in my bare feet I got hurt a little more than if I had my shoes on. I think I stepped on a jelly-fish, or else an electric ele hit me, for I never got such a shock in my life. My foot and even whole limb swelled to twice its natural size and I couldn't walk for a couple of days We got quite a nice collection of starfish but I don't think we will make much out of them. On the re in your pocket. 35 cents .- 104 turn home, about 300 yards from shore the sam-pan broke down and we all got a nice dacking. We looked like drowned rats when we got to our barracks, but soon changed and were none the worse for the swim Our Quartermaster-Seargeant got us up a fine dinner of chicken and cranberry sauce, sauerkrout, roast beef. canned pease and corn, soda crackers and doughnuts. You can't live out here like you can at home, but that is a pretty fair dinner after be ing for fifteen months on bacon and

The natives had quite a celebration and fire-crackers and Chinese lanterns were in demand. I wish you could see some of the lanterns. The natives make them into all sorts of shapes and in imitation of animals They look real pretty at a distance I was at midnight mass at the church here. It was as fine a service as one could wish to see anywhere. Lighted lamps and lights of all descriptions made the church look like some tabernacle.

We didn't get much candy down here nor we didn't hang up our stockings. We simply nestled close to our guns and ate banannas. You can get as many as you can carry for
